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Opening

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with you all.

Sentence

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Follow me

Today's gospel (Mark 9:38-50) tells a story about John and the other disciples running into a stumbling block, an outsider who, as John tells Jesus, "Was not following us."

I don't know what that meant for John and the others but I know that today it often means the other does not look or dress like us, the other does not speak or act like us, the other does not think or believe like us, the other does not do it our way. He or she is not following us. Whatever it was for John and the disciples, they felt threatened by this guy. He was casting out demons, alleviating oppression, offering a new life, all in the name of Jesus. Chances are the guy was getting a name, status, and recognition.

Last week the disciples argued among themselves about who is the greatest (Mark 9:30-37). This week (Mark 9:38-50) they are complaining about this other guy, this stumbling block to their status, power, and recognition.

John, however, wants to make the conversation about this other guy, this stumbling block. "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." Focus in this sentence "**He was not following us.**"

Notice that John does not say, "**He was not following you** (Jesus)," but "He was following us." Jesus never says, "Follow us" - meaning "Follow me and my disciples." He often says, "Follow me" (1:17; 2:14; 8:34; 10:21). Without any authority, John has included the disciples in the concept of following. In the next chapter, we will look at the level of his ambition (10: 35-45), but here we only see his beginnings.

There is a tone of frustration in Jhon's comment. The disciples tried, apparently unsuccessfully, to stop the man casting out demons. Part of his frustration surely comes from his previous (unsuccessful) attempt to perform an exorcism (9: 14-29). Now, these "certified" disciples, who are still learning from their mistake, cannot stop a "non-certified" but successful exorcist who uses the name of Jesus without his authorization. Surely John is concerned here, not only with protecting the sanctity of Jesus' name, but also with protecting the special status of the disciples. As John imagines, if Jesus commissioned the twelve (6: 7-13), he will expect them to accomplish whatever work is to be done in his name.

The disciples drew a circle that left out the exorcist, but Jesus redraws the circle, including him. He who touched lepers (1:41), ate with tax collectors and sinners (2: 15-16), and took little ones in his arms (9:36) draws a large circle. Soon, the disciples will be reminded of this when they try to prevent children from approaching Jesus (10: 13-16).

In the previous text the discussion was about the relationship of the disciples to each other (who was the greatest) now the issue is directed towards the attitude that the disciples have in relation to others, first those who perform powerful acts in the name of Jesus but they are not with them (vv. 38-41) and then the attitude towards "these little ones". The disciples still do not manage to understand the mystery of the death and resurrection of the Master, Jesus in his walk teaches them with acts and actions that they have to do to be first in the kingdom but they continue to think of a

merely human kingdom, perhaps full of luxuries and riches, of power and fight to against there enemies.

Unlike the scribes and Pharisees, who already plot against Jesus as he begins his journey to Jerusalem, the exorcist is not an enemy.

Today, we need to hear this in a church fragmented on many sides - denomination, doctrine, race, socio-economic level, nation, liberal / conservative, social / evangelical action, and charismatic or non-charismatic, Roman Catholic not Roman Catholic. We are always tempted to think of Christians on the other side of the fence as inferior - if we consider them Christians at all. Perhaps, more to the point, clergymen can be jealous of our prerogatives and thus diminish the role of lay people in areas of ministry normally reserved for clergy. Lay people serving in an official capacity can often feel the same jealousy of our authority. Christ asks us to put aside this petty jealousy and respect the gifts of those who work in his name.

Elsewhere, Jesus asks us to love our enemies and help the helpless, but here he directs his blessing to those who help Christians - those who "are Christ's." The point is that the king's emissary is treated with the same respect that the king deserves - with appropriate reward and punishment for those who render or lack such respect. The gift that Jesus mentions is simple - a glass of cold water - something essential to life but that almost anyone can give. The glass of water symbolizes any practical gift - food, clothing, shelter, financial aid, or pulling someone out of a gutter.

The Gospel today invites us today to follow Christ, to follow his love, and his teaching, with faith.

We cannot for any reason say that we are Christians but we do nothing to help our brothers, we cannot call ourselves children of God and see our brothers suffering and do nothing to help satisfy their needs. God does not pray today that we be the salt of the world, that we give true flavor to life not only ours but that of all those who are looking for that Christ in us who go to church. Today we fear our migrant brothers who need our support that I am willing to do to drive away those demons of misery and need. We are going to look for a "certified" apostle like Juan to tell him to do something and to follow him or we are going to be that salt that Jesus asks us to be and help our brothers to expel the demons that oppress him. "Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another." Mark 9:50

Hispanic & Migrant Farmworker Outreach Ministry

The Hispanic & Migrant Farmworker Outreach Ministry in the diocese of Huron is a ministry committed to making our migrant workers visible and supported in our community. Migrant farmworkers are a long way from home and sacrifice family life, support network, and their culture, coming to Canada to work and support their families back home. As Christians we want to welcome, support, include, and make them visible in our Canadian community.

Day care

The aim of St. John's Day Care is to introduce the Anglican faith to families in Long Point Bay Parish by providing Child Care to their children while teaching them about biblical histories using children's books and other materials that can attract children's interest s, puzzles, toys, etc. Also, provide Spanish classes, healthy homemade meals and outdoor activities. Build a bridge between the community and the Anglican Church to encourage families with younger children to acquire knowledge of our Anglican Church.

Greenhouse

This project aims to benefit those less fortunate to have access to fresh vegetables. Families living in a low income, immigrants just arriving to Canada, people who have been negatively impacted due to COVID-19 (job loss)

Population growth and less availability of food material have become global concerns. The world population increases exponentially whereas food production has increased only arithmetically, meaning that the availability of food per capita has decreased. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom by respond to human need by loving service. God wants our lives to overflow with mercy, love, and compassion the marks of His kingdom. As followers of Jesus, we have a choice: respond to unsettling realities in fear and withdraw, or follow Him in responding to the greatest needs of our day with love and hope.
