215- remember that number! It is the number of children found buried in an unmarked grave at a former residential school, staffed and run by the Roman Catholic Church.

Historical information here is based on an article by Eric Hanson (2020) which you can access on the web. The Government of Canada enlisted the Roman Catholic church (among others) in staffing and running the residential school system. Children were removed from their homes against their will and without the consent of their parents and sent to the residential schools. They were forbidden to speak their own language, acknowledge their own heritage, culture, and customs and were taught English. Regular physical and sexual abuse are well documented. All of this was intended to eliminate the aboriginal communities from Canada. (enabling them to be more like us). "If this is what you're like, how you treat little children – I want no part of it!" I'd have said.

All of this is history! Most of us have been at least somewhat aware of this. What absolutely shocked me, was the sudden realization, with the discovery of this unmarked grave, of the horror that was perpetrated on these helpless children. Not one or two, or a few – 215! And that's just one grave!

Stolen from their families and homes, robbed of their language and their culture, all in the effort to make them more like us! We completely forgot that when we arrived on this continent, it was only with the aid and support of the aboriginal communities already here, that the white settlers were able to survive.

But what absolutely tore at my heart was the thought of the abuse with which those children were treated. The total disregard for their God given humanity. Removing them from their families, their culture and traditions – all that made them who they were! All of that abusive behaviour simply so that we might be more comfortable.

215! not a couple, a few, - 215 children! Try to imagine the confusion, the fear, the sense of being totally lost with nowhere to turn! I find it hard to imagine a more inhumane, arrogant treatment of any other human beings. And that's just one grave.

That we could lose so totally any touch with the Jesus I know who took little children into his arms as the model of who we are called to be.

I honestly had difficulty sleeping last night thinking of the fear, the uncertainty, the confusion those little children had to live with; with nowhere to turn – except to those purported followers of Jesus, who had no idea of how horrified Jesus would have been at their treatment of those children.

And, in the light of day, I had to wonder if, perhaps in moments of ill considered 'zeal', I might have been as blindly zealous.

We must never forget the simple standard Jesus left us: "Love one another as I have loved you."

We grieve with the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation, who has just released news that the unidentified graves of 215 children have been found on the grounds of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School in Kamloops, B.C. The devastating pain and loss this news triggers are not isolated to Kamloops, but is shared by all who lost family, friends or community members to Indian Residential Schools. So many Indigenous children never came home from the schools where they were forcibly taken, and the weight of the trauma that loss has wrecked in Indigenous communities, is still causing intense harm today.

In humility, the church calls for a time of prayer and lament to honour the lives of those children whose graves were just found and for all family, friends and communities who have lost loved ones through the Indian Residential School system—for whom this news opens fresh wounds. We also call for a time of reflection and recommitment to reconciliation. As we approach the month of June, which is National Indigenous History month, we encourage all church members to reflect on the harmful history and from that reflection seek renewed ways to work for healing and reconciliation with Indigenous people.
