

Reflection for the 2nd Sunday of Easter from Rev. Jack Cox

As I was looking at today's Gospel, 2 things occurred to me. The 1st was an admission by a colleague over the Easter weekend that he had never met the risen Christ. The second thing was in today's Gospel, that when Jesus went to his closest followers after his death, the doors where they were gathered were locked. That immediately prompted a question for me: How many of those of us who call ourselves Christians have never really met the risen Christ/Jesus? Now I also know that we Anglicans tend to be a little uncomfortable when we hear that "Come to Jesus" call/language. But what I also know is that when we talk about Easter, Resurrection, The Risen Lord, if I asked, "Do you believe...?" and the answer is "Yes!", what if I then asked why do you believe? The usual response would point to the bible and the resurrection narratives of the gospels or to somebody who told you about Easter, or some response that indicates that's our faith tradition. Rarely would I expect someone to talk about their personal experience of meeting Jesus. In those instances, I would probable think (but probably wouldn't say) 'so you believe because of what somebody else experienced?' Now that's ok. We all have to start somewhere. But, for me, that's not the place to stop – and I can only say that because I was introduced to a way of 'praying' that, at its core, is the visceral experience of meeting, being with Jesus and learning how to listen.

It wasn't until I was in my 40's that I was introduced to contemplative prayer. (By that time I had been a member of a religious order for over 20 years, had studied Theology full time for at least 6 years (3 years at the post graduate level) and been ordained for at least 4 years, and had never heard of contemplative prayer). So don't feel badly if this hasn't been something you've come across. So when I read today's gospel, what jumped out at me was the 'locked doors' of the gospel. What are the locked doors that have kept us from really, personally, meeting Jesus? I suspect the simplest answer was the same as it had been for me – I had simply not had the 'opportunity' (or if I had it, I wasn't taught how to 'see' it).

So let me introduce you to contemplative prayer. This kind of prayer/reflection/listening is dead simple! It really is all about **'listening'**, about letting the Spirit speak to you through a text, a personal experience. It's about learning how to relax, just open your mind and heart and allowing God to speak to you (through just about anything – a biblical text, a personal experience, a conversation with someone etc., etc., the medium for the message is limitless). The medium I will use for instructional purposes will be biblical texts. But the same process works for personal experiences, struggles, challenges, etc., etc. It's about trying to 'listen' to what God is try to communicate to me through personal 'experiences'.

As an example, you could pick a text, a life experience or a problem - and sit with it, allowing God's presence to 'speak'. How do we let it speak? There are several possible paths: Quiet your mind, open yourself to God's presence and simply sit quietly with that presence and that text or life's problem. Let the problem and God's presence be together. What do you see? What do you hear? Does the presence of God change how you see the 'problem'? God's presence doesn't always suddenly change/fix the problem. But in time, God's presence does 'change' the problem. It may change how we see the problem. It may change the possible direction we could take (a change we wouldn't have seen without God's presence.

This practice of 'seeing'/ experiencing God's presence doesn't suddenly change everything – but, in time, it does change everything! But it definitely does take practice!
