Reflection for 4th Sunday of Lent from John Maroney

Good evening sisters and brothers;

I came to Canada in 1983 in order to spend time with my mother who was visiting my brother Mike at the time. I was only supposed to stay for 4 months. It was to be a time for reflection and discernment. I had a very important decision to make, and I needed to clear my head. I had been struggling with the decision of whether or not to enter into the life of Jesuit ministry. As you all know by now, my father was a month removed from being ordained a Jesuit priest when God showed him a different life path. There had been intimations that I was considering this path as a way of finishing my father's unfinished business. Nothing could have been farther from the truth. The call was genuine, but I had yet to surrender to it. At the same time as I was struggling with this decision, I was considering a career in the United States Marine Corps. Ever since I was a young lad, I had been interested in all things military. Not out of the desire to play with big guns nor for the power, but for a desire to serve. My parents had taught me that a life without service is devoid of substance and meaning. I went as far as to have a conversation with the Major who was in charge of the Marine detachment protecting the U.S. embassy in Mexico City. He was the father of one of my classmates. He was convinced that I had what it took to become an officer in the Marines.

The Marines are the ones who have to do most of the dirt work during wartime. They march into danger with purpose and on purpose. They are almost always the first ones into combat. During the Second World War, they fought in places with haunted names such as Bougainville, Guadalcanal, and who can ever forget the Marines hoisting the Stars and Stars on Mt. Suribachi on Iwo Jima.

And as a teenager I was moved by the Marine motto. "No Man Left Behind". Since then, women have joined the ranks of the Marines so it should read "No person Left Behind". This is a powerful statement that speaks volumes to the dedication of the men and women of the Marine Corps. It means that no matter what, even in the face of death, they will be there for each other.

As followers of Christ, "Leave No Person Behind" should be our motto as well. We are called to love our neighbours as we love ourselves. This is what unconditional love is all about. But when we turn our backs on those who need us the most, we are leaving someone behind. About a year and a half ago I was coming out of Tim Horton's when I was stopped by a gentleman. He had tattoos on almost every part of his body, had many piercings and was actually sort of frightening. He asked me if I were a priest, and I told him that I was. He asked me if he could steal a couple of minutes of my time. We sat down on a nearby bench and he opened up. He told me that he was an addict who had been clean for 3 months. He said that he had been thinking about God in the months he had not been using. As he was speaking his body language began to change. His eyes softened, he smiled and he suddenly seemed a completely different man. Where at first, I had seen nothing but tattoos and a disheveled being, I now saw him as he really was. A living breathing human being who had once been the apple of his mother's eye, who had had dreams, and who had unfortunately fallen through the cracks, left alone and isolated, like something discarded for being worthless. What I saw was a man of worth and substance. And he told me that he had been to various churches to see about becoming a member, and he had repeatedly been told that he was not welcome. The faith community had turned their backs on him and left him behind. He asked me if he would be welcome at Christ Church. I could have wept. I told him that not only would he be welcome, but that he would be celebrated as a new member of our faith family.

He never showed up, but that is okay. I have all the faith in the world that one day he will walk into the sanctuary. What was important that day was that he realized that he was loved, that he was a child of God, worthy of love, compassion, respect.

Our sign at the front of the church says

ALL ARE WELCOME

What it could read is

LEAVE NO PERSON BEHIND

Our hospitality to engage with scripture and partake of the Holy Eucharist is extended to everyone. As followers of Christ, we have a responsibility to seek those who are in need, and to offer friendship. The pride flag flying in the wind tells the LGBTQ community that this is a safe place to come and worship. The sanctuary is not ours. It is the house of God, where everyone is welcome and no person is left behind.

As we slowly return to some semblance of normalcy, it would be wise to use this as a mantra, because it encapsulates the teachings of Christ, the radical teacher.
