

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Reflection for February 7th from the Rev'd John



Good evening friends,

I hope you did not think that Padre Juan had forgotten about you.

That would never happen.

I extend a welcome to our reader friends in Mexico, the U.S. and England and the Parish of Long Point Bay. Please know that you are considered part of our family and that you are in our thoughts and prayers. Our little group is growing and it is quite exciting. We are a faith community that cares deeply for one another. And in these uncertain times of pandemic, this certainty is a comfort. Okay, now to my reflection.

It is no secret that Anglicans have a tendency to shy away from the word evangelism. As soon as we hear this word, we might think of someone standing on a corner on a soapbox, Bible in hand, exhorting those walking by to repent. This could not be further from the truth. Evangelism simply means to tell one's story. And we all have wonderful and varied stories about our faith and our connection to God. And we should not keep these stories to ourselves. I think about all stories that are represented in our little group and it fills me with joy and gives me hope. Our stories are what give vitality to our life of faith, and they are inexorably connected to the Holy Spirit. We must tell our stories because they lend grace and beauty to the landscape of our ordinary lives.

If you would indulge me, I would like to share a story with you this evening.

This evening as we were returning from our customary walk, I happened to glance up and was struck by the beauty of our century old barn. It stands empty now, but the vast interior is filled with echoes of days gone by. Like an abandoned amusement park at the seashore, the voices of the past can still be imagined, almost heard. And as I stared at this magnificent repository of memories, I was drawn to a day long, long, ago, and I closed my eyes and was transported thirty-three five years back in time....

I woke up to hear the sound of the horses galloping madly in the north pasture. I ran out just to make sure that they had not broken through the gate. They had not, but they all came running at a trot to greet me. It was a beautiful summer morning. The sound of the cicadas was an indication that we were in for a hot and muggy day. The summer had been particularly hot, and there had been many thunderstorms. As long as the weather was not too bad, the horses spent the night in the pasture. They loved the freedom afforded by the wide-open space.

I was alone at the farm that weekend. Everyone else had travelled to Houston to visit relatives. I was not nervous about being in charge, because I thought I was prepared for anything and everything. Really, what could go wrong?

As I was eating lunch, I turned on the television and saw that there was a special weather statement from Environment Canada. It said that there was a possibility for severe weather in the afternoon. I peered out the window and saw nothing but Honolulu blue sky and brilliant sunlight. I made sure the horses were well watered and sat down to read a book. Wouldn't you know it, I fell fast asleep. When I woke up and looked out the window, I did not see blue sky. I walked out to the pasture to find the horses standing in a line with their rear ends turned to the east. I knew that this was probably not a good sign. And then, quite suddenly, the clouds cover became thicker and began to change colour. It went from a dark grey to a yellow greenish hue. My mother was born in the Midwest. As a child she had told me that if the clouds ever turned green, it was time to head to the basement. The horses began to get nervous, and came up to the gate. And as I was pondering what to do next, the wind, which had been increasing in strength, suddenly stopped. The tree branches seemed to droop in the stagnant air. And then, the wind returned, but it was in the opposite direction and it was colder. And as I looked up, the clouds above were rotating. It was obvious that the horses needed to come in.

Usually, we had three or four people with halters and lead ropes to bring the gang inside. But here I was, alone, with a possible tornado bearing down on us. By this time the horses were becoming agitated, for they sensed inclement weather. And I could not help but think how the disciples must have felt as their little fishing boat was tossed about on the waves, as Jesus slept on the pillows. They implored Jesus to wake up and save them, which he did after telling then that they were of little faith. I looked up and asked God to help me. I thought I was prepared for every eventuality, but that was not the case. The same applies to our daily lives. Are we prepared for anything and everything? Is our faith strong enough to sustain us through storms that come up unexpectedly? The gate to the pasture was only 55 feet from the gate to the paddock which led to the indoor arena. I opened the gate to the paddock and approached the horses with a halter and lead shank in hand. They sensed that I was there to bring them in and they settled down. My plan was predicated on the behaviour of pachyderms at a circus. Elephants will walk in a straight line as long as the one in the lead is properly controlled by a handler. So, I unclipped the latch to the gate at the pasture and put the halter on Abby, a level headed gelding who never gave us any trouble. Leaving the gate open, I began to walk towards the paddock gate. And lo and behold, all eight horses were following in a straight line. And right when I reached the paddock gate, there was a tremendous flash of lightning and a terrible thunderclap. And in an instant, the horses bolted in every direction. I took Abby into the arena and ran back outside. As the rain came down in torrents, with lightning, thunder, and high winds, I was able to find the horses, one by one, and bring them back into the arena. I battened down the hatches, and got out the grain buckets. The weather deteriorated quickly, but all was well inside. And Eddie, who was usually shy, came over and put his head on my shoulder as thought to say high.

It is because we all know that life has a way of brewing storms completely out of the blue. Just when we think we have everything under control, something unexpected happens. We have been living with this pandemic for 10 months now. The storms continue to rage. But we have shown surprising resilience and amazing faith. We cannot be prepared for everything life throws our way. But we can be spiritually prepared to face whatever comes our way. We just have to live our lives according to Jesus' great commandment

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it. Love your neighbour as yourself. All the law and the prophets hang on these two commandments.

With these two commandments we have what it takes to face any storm. We are prepared. And since we are called to love our neighbour as ourselves, we are prepared to help each other.

We will continue to be there for one another, always.

And we will continue to tell our stories.



Dear friends,

With the declaration of a State of Emergency for the province of Ontario beginning at 12:01am on Thursday, January 14, 2021, the RED Stage Loving Your Neighbours Guidelines have been updated. The RED Stage guidelines may be found here. Below are the updates as well as some reminders for this period of time. The next few weeks will be difficult in many ways but we are not alone. God is with us, "an ever present help in times of trouble." May you feel God's presence with you during these during these days.

- Recording or Live-streaming services: a maximum of three (3) persons will permitted to be present to record or live-stream worship services, including any AV people. If a parish feels a strong need to a maximum of two others present, they may seek permission from their Territorial Archdeacon for a maximum of five persons, total. This request is to include the reasons for needing more people and a description of the locations and movement of people throughout the service. While the provincial maximum is higher than this number, we believe it is important for the church to lead by example in reducing our non-household contacts as much as possible.
- Even though there will be very few people present when recording or filming these services, masking and physical distancing guidelines must be followed. If a mask is removed to preach or officiate, no other person may be within 12 feet (2m) of the person who is not wearing a mask.
- If the services are filmed in segments so that more than three people are seen to be involved but are not present at the same time, it would be helpful to have that stated at the beginning or end of the service.
- The dropping off of Sunday School lessons and materials, worship materials, parish newsletters, bulletins, etc is permitted if done in a <u>non-contact</u> manner.
- Church buildings are to remain <u>closed</u> except for the following:
 - o Recording or live-streaming worship as above
 - Counting of offerings: two persons only may be present in the building to count offerings and prepare the bank deposit. As we are not worshipping in person, there will likely be less physical offerings so this may only need to be done bi-weekly. The counters are to wear masks and to maintain physical distancing.
 - Parish office staff or clergy who need access to office equipment to provide parish materials. Only those tasks which absolutely cannot be done from their home should be done at the church. Time at the church is to be minimized as much as possible.

- Regular security/maintenance checks done by a single individual (or couple from the same household) as required by insurance carrier.
- Food insecurity or Out of the Cold programs.
- 12-step programs (maximum of 10 people/meeting)
- o A schedule should be developed so that the above persons do not overlap.
- A communication should be sent to the parish informing them that the church building is closed for the present time and that they may not drop into the building for any reason without prior authorization from the wardens.

Should any of our restrictions differ from those of the provincial government or your local health unit, the more stringent regulations are always to be followed.

Ash Wednesday and Lenten resources will be shared within the next couple of weeks.
