

Reflection for Sunday July 18th from Rev. Enrique Martinez

Good Shepherd

He told them: "Come alone to a deserted place, to rest a little." But because so many people went, they didn't even have time to eat. Jesus saw a great crowd and felt compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he was teaching them for a long time.

This text has two parts, the first is to retreat, to the desert, to silence, to the place where we are far from all the possessions in this world that distract us, and there is so much bustle in the world and we forget ourselves attending to the temple, and above all that encounter with God in his son Jesus Christ who calls us in the midst of all that bustle to tell us *"Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while."* How long do I take to attend to my relationship with God? How often do I seek to be alone to find myself and talk with God? Do I realize that it is necessary to have time for myself to meet with my family, with God?

After the first part, he continues to teach us about conversion, not only to attend to physical and physiological needs, but also to teach us to grow intellectually, socially, as a family and as a person, to grow spiritually. Do I follow the example and humility of the teacher Jesus Christ? Do I teach and help those who need to grow in any aspect of life? Was I interested in letting Jesus Christ teach me through his Word, through his daily message? Do I teach and give thanks for what God the Father provides us? Come yourselves apart into a deserted place" (v. 31). Jesus sees that the disciples are tired after their mission, and invites them to go to a separate place where they can rest. Soon Jesus will have compassion for the crowd, but he first has compassion for his apostles, who had not yet had time to eat. The work of a disciple must balance time of service with time of physical and spiritual renewal. Vincent de Paul advises, "Take care to take care of your health. It is a trap of the devil, used to deceive good souls, to instigate them to do more than they can, so that the time comes when they can do nothing." Jesus is the good shepherd who describes the Psalm 23 "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff- they comfort me.". Jesus as a shepherd knows his sheep and knows that they are wounded, tired and hungry and he takes them to green pastures to rest and to heal their wounds and be filled with joy because the sheep have returned to their shepherd safe and sound.

The Good Shepherd lays down his life for his sheep, this means that the good shepherd in the day to day is consumed, he is spent for his sheep. It is the needs of the sheep that dictate to the shepherd how to organize his life. His hours of rest, his time to eat and the direction he walks, and others are established according to the good of the sheep, and not according to the tastes and desires of the shepherd.

Some characteristics of this Good Shepherd help us to better know the heart of God: The Good Shepherd knows his sheep, for him each sheep is particular. He knows his or her specific habits. He has special attention for each one. Each sheep has its own identity, generally characterized by a particular name, which means that it is not just a number. It is not that at the end of the day the Good Shepherd counts them and if one is missing, he goes out to look for any sheep that was lost. He looks at his flock and realizes that there is just "such" sheep missing and goes out to look for it

calling it by its name, he imagines where it has gone because he knows it very well, he knows its tastes and its temptations.

And that is why in the second part of today's Gospel Jesus feels compassion for his people, who had many shepherds in the town of Israel, Pharisees, high priest and the Roman Empire as well as many others who called themselves shepherds. (V34) Jesus sees a crowd that is alone, who have been abandoned by their shepherds because they were "*The hired hand*" As Jesus says in the Gospel of Saint John, they were not shepherds, but they stole and abused their sheep.

The story of the crowds approaching Jesus in Genezareth to be healed (vv. 53-56). They found the Good Shepherd and moved towards that direction to meet Jesus. When Jesus arrives at the place where they are to rest, a large crowd awaits him. Jesus and his disciples have reason to be upset. They have not eaten (v. 31), and they needed to rest even before they rowed the boat to its destination. We would expect tired and hungry men to respond angrily to this unexpected demand that requires more of their already scarce energy.

But on the contrary Jesus, full of love and compassion, approaches those sheep and heals them, and then teaches and cares for them. Mark does not tell us how the disciples respond, but Jesus has compassion on the crowd, because they are "like sheep without a shepherd" (v. 34). Jesus has direct answers for those who seek their own satisfaction, but he also has a soft heart for those in need.

"They were healthy" (v. 56). This gospel calls us today in the midst of a world full of difficulties, full of noises that prevent us from resting and finding the good shepherd. Today the gospel asks us to stop before the different situations that you are experiencing today, whatever it may be, no matter how good or bad that situation is, the apostles arrived full of joy for all that they had been able to do in the name of Jesus.; But He calls them to now feed on the body and blood of the risen Christ, so that all his wounds are healed and they become strong again to continue facing the circumstances of life.

This invitation from Jesus the Good Shepherd is to look at ourselves as children of God and have a close encounter with Him. Also, to know that we are a family in the church of Christ and in it we have to regain strength, and be prepared to continue helping all our brothers and sisters in the world as *"the Good Samaritan"*, We are called to serve with the word of God and the Eucharist, to those who are sick, those who are hungry and thirsty, those who are in prisons, lead them to also have that encounter with the Son of the living God, with Jesus. You cannot be a Christian alone, but being a Christian is living in the church, in the body of Christ, helping and caring for each other. Amen
