


**9th Sunday after Pentecost**  
**July 25th 2021**



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**Opening**

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with you all.

**Sentence**

A great prophet has arisen among us! God has visited his people!

*Luke 7.16*

**Collect**

O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, increase and multiply upon us your mercy, that with you as our ruler and guide, we may so pass through things temporal, that we lose not the things eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

**Readings**

You'll remember that I've said on a number of occasions that God doesn't think or evaluate the way we do – or perhaps the way we've been taught to. The 1st reading this Sunday is a good example. Remember when David was chosen to be king of Israel, he was not the oldest, or the strongest of Jesse's sons (those were the normal criteria for selection to a high office such as King). Not only is David not the strongest of his brothers, he is not the most moral of them either. Even as King of Israel, David has an illicit relationship with Bathsheba (the wife of one of David's commanders). David manoeuvres to put Uriah (Bathsheba's husband) in the front line of the next battle and then has the army fall back leaving Uriah defenceless. Uriah is killed. It is the child of that relationship between David and Bathsheba (Solomon) that succeeds David as King. Solomon is blessed with incredible wisdom and builds the 1<sup>st</sup> magnificent temple for Israel. Does this tell you anything about how God 'thinks' about or responds to us?

Why do I point out these kinds of things? I do it so that we don't presume we always know what God is asking or not asking of us (I'm not good enough, holy enough, wise enough). It is so that we try always to remain open to the voice of God, the choices of God and never presume we know what God is asking of us or doing in our lives. To do that requires that we are listening as carefully as we can for the voice or the presence of God. And I would emphasize, that God is always speaking to us (or trying to speak to us if we'd just practice listening).

How do we 'listen' for the voice of God or 'look' for the presence of God? The process is really simple. The hardest part is remaining quiet, not 'doing' anything but waiting quietly, patiently – even when nothing seems to be happening. Let me give you one simple example. This is sometimes called the 'prayer of imagination'. I'll use a familiar text (Lk 2:8-14). It's the story of the shepherds from Luke's gospel – (but you can use any number of familiar texts). I use this text because it is familiar and not so complicated that we spend time trying to figure out what it means.

1. Pick a quiet and comfortable place (where you can sit/lie down – be undisturbed). Mark the place of your text and, if you prefer, tell God in a sentence or two why you're here (that's also so it's clear to you why you're here – what's your intention/hope). Take a moment to compose yourself, quiet your mind and heart and simply open yourself to God's presence. If God 'speaks' to you, moves you, just remain quietly receptive – listening, receiving. If nothing happens, pick up the text and read it very slowly – savouring each word. See the scene unfolding in your imagination – what do you see? What do you hear? When you've finished reading, set the text down and try to see the scene you've just read. What do you see? What do you hear? What do you feel? Can you simply be at that scene in your imagination? Simply try to be passively receptive/present. Sit with that for about 10 minutes. If something 'happens' stay quietly with that, if nothing happens repeat the process from the quiet slow reading.

(Just as an aside, don't forget that shepherds were people that no one wanted to have a relationship with, shepherds were the lowest of the low in 1<sup>st</sup> century Palestine.)

This is a basic form for contemplation. It is a quiet, often wordless way of being present and receptive to God. It really is simple but may take some practice to become familiar and comfortable with the process so that the process itself isn't a distraction.

This quiet 'listening' form of prayer is built on the belief that God seeks a real, personal relationship with each of us (we are important enough, valuable enough, good enough in God's eyes). And God will go to any lengths to show us that love and care if we just give God a chance – and even when we don't, God never gives up on us!) As an aside, I grew up in a church that was definitely 'sin' focused – a church where I never felt good enough. Trust me, if God throws screw-ups to the

curb (as I was taught to believe) I'd have spent my life there. But my experience of God has been consistently: "Oh my, look at the mess you've gotten yourself into! Here, let me help you up, let's dust you off, and we'll carry on down the road together.")

May you listen for God's voice as you journey. May you hear and experience God's presence. And may you experience God's loving and healing care in the worst of times as well as in the best of times of your life.
