
The Sunday of the Resurrection Easter day April 4th 2021

This week we have 2 Reflections as we celebrate Easter Sunday – The rising of Christ

Reflection for Easter Sunday from Rev. Enrique

Christ is Risen.

Christ is Risen Hallelujah, Hallelujah.

Today is the Day the Lord acted. The Gospel of St. Mark tells us how the first to carry the message are women, how they were bravely at the feet of the Savior when he was crucified, despite the fact that almost all his apostles had fled, they continued without fear at the feet of the Savior crucified.

It was also the women who carried the first message that God's son had risen.

Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome go out to bear witness to the resurrection, despite the fact that this news caused them terror, fright the Gospel tells us; But their love does not only allow them to pray and set an example with their virtuous life so that others may know Christ. They feel the need, essential to our Christian vocation, to do something, speak, preach, attend, help, deliver the Good News of the Resurrection, they do everything they can to make the love of Christ known to the world.

They understood that love cannot go in only one direction, but is a reciprocal delivery of both sides. They received the love of God and they felt the need to give that same love to all the disciples of Christ.

The resurrection works a real transformation in Magdalene and the other women. They no longer cry. Now they are sent by Christ through the angel, to announce the joy of his triumph: "Go and tell my brothers ..." For the first time in the Gospel, Christ calls us his brothers! The divine sonship has been realized: we are truly adopted children of God and brothers of Christ! And as such, we participate in the same mission ... We cannot keep the resurrection in the trunk of memories, but proclaim it to the four winds like Mary Magdalene and the women who were with her, so that many other men and women become convinced apostles of the Kingdom of Christ.

Let us remember that Jesus the Nazarene, the one who was crucified: they were not titles of exaltation for Jesus. Being a Nazarene was not a place to be proud of, and being crucified was a title of shame, not honor. But Jesus was not ashamed to be called a "Nazarene" and "crucified." "This description of what was shame Jesus has made it his crown of glory and it is the same that his disciples have to live while delivering the good news of the Kingdom.

Many times, we are used to giving, to giving, to helping, but we are seldom open to receiving.

In our churches we hear many times that we please collaborate for, that we lack funds for, that we are short of and we must do more ... today Jesus invites us to be willing to receive, that we cannot stop receiving at the same time as we are ready to give, it's like love works in two directions.

God himself was willing to receive the mistreatment and humiliation that our sins cause in order to give us the salvation we needed.

Today's Gospel invites us to live the joy of the Resurrection, remembering that the greatest expression of God's love and that this love cannot be kept. That if we truly receive that love from God, we have to give it to all the brothers who hope to see the Risen Christ.

Hallelujah Christ our Lord is risen.

This Easter morning is different to those of my recent experience. It doesn't feel like Easter. I'm stuck inside, as are you, and we aren't able to meet and celebrate as we ought to. This Easter, though, there's one thing that has been some comfort to me, and I hope it will for you too.

Easter morning has always been, and is meant to be, dissonant. Easter is at odds with the world around it. It's joyful, but strange in its joy. This morning, Christians are meant to overflow with gladness, to beam with the joy of resurrection, to celebrate Christ's victory over death, and to embrace the certainty of their eternal hope. Easter is the end of death's tyranny and the beginning of something new; new life, a bright and shining light in the darkness. And all of these things are bound up in the phrase, "he is risen, alleluia." This sentiment has always been dissonant with the visible realities of want and death. That is the heart of the Christian message. "He is risen" is light in darkness.

The light of Christ and the joy of the resurrection are worth celebrating because they are so at odds with normalcy and expectation. The message of Easter is such good news because it stands so drastically apart. The more foolish Easter celebration seems—the more going on around us—the more poignant its message. Death no longer enjoys an eternal hold on humanity. Through Christ, we have realized the promise of eternal life.

That's what Easter is, and how it began. But for the earliest Christians, life was dangerous. Death loomed around every corner. The same Roman soldiers who nailed Jesus on a cross wandered their city streets and help them in their violent grip.

And it's this world, populated and possessed by the agents of fear, and by death's friends, that the Apostle Paul defied when he asked "Death, where is your sting, grave where is your victory?"


Because Jesus had died and been buried, but rose alive from this grave. "He is risen" is the heart of our faith. "He is risen" is the light that outshines the darkness. "He is risen" is the joyful message that drives away every fear.

I would love to be able to stand with you in church this morning. I would love to celebrate with bread and wine, the shared gift of life and love. I would love to revel in the gift of the Spirit that binds Christ's gathered church. I'd love to sing in our alleluias, and repeat them freely. I'd love to celebrate the risen body of Christ with you, the body of Christ. But today looks a little different to other easters. If you're reading this reflection, it means you're probably at home, probably not gathered with other Christians, probably not able to join in the chorus and reply, "He is risen, he is risen in deed, alleluia." And so, for you, this year, the joy of easter will be particularly dissonant with the day. In some ways, we are missing out on something good. In other ways, though, this year gives us a much clearer image of the joy of Easter. It is not the kind of joy that only flows when all else is well. It is the joy of the freed, the dissonant joy of light in the darkness, the joy that says "death where is your sting," the joy that arises when the current darkness has been pierced by a brightening light, because death has met its end in Christ's resurrection, and because there is a day coming when all death will be swallowed up in life.

And so, I invite you to join in the chorus of easter. I invite you to witness the joy of resurrection, to join your voices to those of the saints of easters long passed, to the voices of the apostles who witnessed resurrection, to the voices of the prophets who prepared Jesus' way, and to the voice of Mary Magdalene who was the first to hear the best news in the garden of an empty tomb. He is risen, alleluia.
