Reflection for 4th Sunday of Easter from AD Rick

Reflection: Acts 4:5-12 “The believers Share their possessions”

I trust that you have all heard many sermons on Jesus the Good Shepherd, which is the Gospel for this Sunday. Perhaps Fr. Justin will want to talk about it. It is very comforting and wonderful that we are cared for by God, and that Jesus laid down his life to bring us life.

I suspect you have not often heard a sermon on the Acts reading for this Sunday. In our world of individualism and capitalism, the story of how the first disciples shared everything collectively runs against the grain. Please read the story and the next chapter which deals with two disciples who try and cheat the church and end up dying for their sin of fraud. I find it amazing that these stories actually remain in our cycle of Sunday readings. Who knew that the early church functioned like a socialist system, “from each according to their ability to each according to their need.” I wonder why the disciples chose to organize this way. No one knows for sure but I would like to offer a couple of theories that might help us find a spiritual lesson in this time of Covid.

I suspect that they just fell into this way of doing things because it was the way they did things when they were following Jesus. We can see from the Gospel stories that the whole of Jesus ministry was supported by the believers sharing resources. Jesus’ ministry so valued that people freely supported him and his disciples. He was even criticized for “eating with tax collectors and sinners.” Jesus didn’t see a problem with this, if someone had more than enough, it was good that they were showing hospitality, and in return Jesus taught with his words and presence, all things come from God and return to God.

Jesus’ teaching about the Kingdom of God is the second reason I think the disciples found it natural to share their possessions so that no one was in need. Jesus talked a lot about God’s unconditional love and care for everyone, even the “unjust” or foolish. Jesus follows in the tradition of the Hebrew laws that talk about Justice, sabbath, care for the alien in the land, (immigrant or refugee). He seems to believe that God doesn’t want anyone to be left behind in the areas of safety, health and food security.

The Christian Church for centuries has largely ignored the very real and radical biblical teachings about equity, and justice for all but especially for these most vulnerable, when it comes to economic and social policy Jesus was a socialist. Today this passage from Acts seems totally counter cultural, and it is. Jesus’ view of the world was very different from the conservative religious right or the individualistic, capitalistic political ideologies of our time. Hence this passage is largely ignored.

If the pandemic is teaching us anything it is that our capitalistic society is broken. This week a leading health care doctor described how Covid is spreading most quickly and dangerously within groups of people who don’t have the option to work from home. They are people who still have to go to work, often at low paying jobs, and who have not had the benefit of vaccination. Whole families are becoming infected because the political agenda is to “balance” the economic and health care impacts of Covid. The doctor warned that this strategy wasn’t really going to work and that soon people will be triaged for ICU beds and people who could have lived will die. Her recommendation was to stop all non essential commerce, and vaccinate those who need to provide food and health care until this pandemic is brought under control. Why are billionaires growing even richer in this pandemic and yet the poorest in our society are being asked to risk their lives and their families lives on the altar of greed?

I think I know how Jesus and the early church would have handled this crisis: the priority would not be economic but social. God loves people not money and as we know, “the **love** of money is the root of all kinds of evil.” 1 Tim 6:10

The last reason that the disciples shared everything is stated in the first verse of our reading, “Now the whole group of those who believed were of **one heart and soul.**” They shared because they loved, they did as Jesus commanded, “love one another as I have loved you.”

How can we too love others, in our time and place in history, with the love of Jesus?

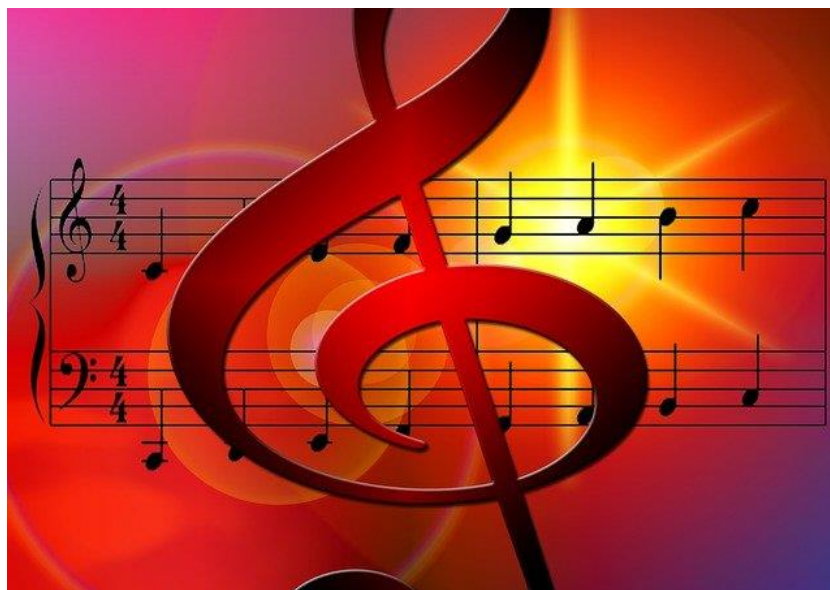
Hymn Texts – Sunday, April 25, 2021
