“Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.”
Luke 11:1

I wonder if this disciple had any idea of the huge world that would be opened up with this simple request. On several occasions the disciples witnessed Jesus slipping away to a quiet place. If that is where you find yourself this Lent, then I would invite you to look again at the words Jesus gave his disciples in the Lord’s Prayer. Read them with fresh eyes and new enthusiasm.

Due to the ever-present threat of COVID-19 in our area. It has been decided to suspend all church services immediately, until further notice.

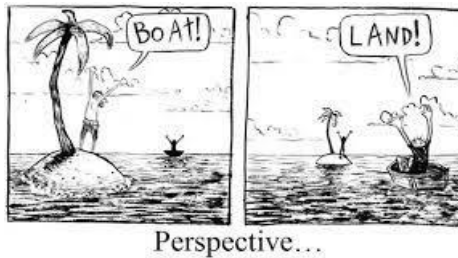

Parents need to know that *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind* is based on the true story of William Kamkwamba (Maxwell Simba), a 13-year-old boy living in a small village in Malawi, Africa, who created a device that would restore the land and save his people after flooding ruined their grain fields. Expect sad moments, including some significant deaths. There are also a few violent sequences: Government officials beat a village chieftain, and thieves invade a home, threatening two women. A sprinkling of curse words are heard, including "damn," "hell," "bulls--t." The movie's source material is Kamkwamba's same-named book. Both English and Chewa (subtitled) are spoken in the film, which has clear, strong themes of perseverance, courage, curiosity, and integrity.



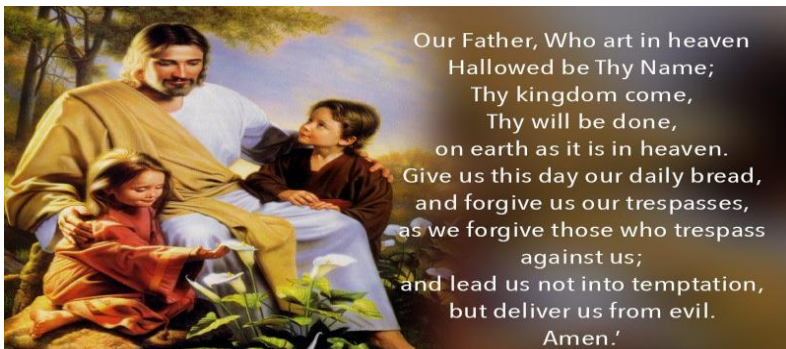

April

This week in history

1500 - Portuguese explorer [Pedro Álvares Cabral](#), while on a voyage tracing [Vasco da Gama's](#) 1497–99 water route to India, sighted the mainland of South America near the present-day city of Pôrto Seguro, Brazil.

1912 - On this day in 1912, American aviator [Harriet Quimby](#) became the first woman to fly across the [English Channel](#), guiding her French Blériot [monoplane](#) through heavy overcast from [Dover](#), England, to Hardelot, France.

1934 -The *Daily Mail* printed a photograph that reportedly depicted the small head and neck of the [Loch Ness monster](#); the iconic image, widely known as the “surgeon's photograph,” sparked an international sensation but was later revealed to be a hoax.

1968 [Pierre Elliott Trudeau](#) of the [Liberal Party](#) became prime minister of [Canada](#); in that post, he discouraged the French separatist movement, oversaw the formation of a new constitution, and established relations with China

1982 - The [Canada Act](#), also known as the Constitution Act, took effect on this day in 1982, establishing certain individual rights, preserving parliamentary supremacy, and making [Canada](#) a wholly independent, fully sovereign state.

Taste & See

Lemon Pound Cake



Ingredients

3 c. all-purpose flour, plus more for pan
1 tsp. baking soda
1 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
3 sticks unsalted butter, at room temperature plus more for pan
2 3/4 c. granulated sugar
3 Tbsp (packed) grated lemon zest plus ¼ cup lemon juice
6 large eggs, at room temperature
1 tbsp. vanilla
1 c. sour cream, at room temperature
For icing
1 1/3 c. confectioners' sugar
2 to 3 Tbsp fresh lemon juice
Lemon zest strips, for sprinkling

Instructions

1. Heat oven to 350°F. Very generously butter and flour a large (15-cup) Bundt pan, tapping out excess flour. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, and salt.
2. In large bowl, using an electric mixer, beat butter, granulated sugar, and lemon zest on medium-high until light and fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes. Reduce mixer speed to medium and add eggs one at a time, beating until incorporated before adding the next and scraping down bowl as necessary. Mix in vanilla and lemon juice.
3. Reduce mixer speed to low and add flour mixture in three parts, alternating with sour cream and beating just until incorporated (do not overmix).
4. Spoon large spoonfuls of batter into prepared pan, tapping pan on counter every so often, then smooth top. Bake on middle rack for 35 minutes. Tent with foil, rotate pan and bake until a wooden pick inserted comes out with loose crumbs attached, 20 to 30 minutes more.
5. Let cake cool in pan 5 minutes, then invert onto wire rack set over a rimmed baking sheet or waxed paper and remove pan. Let cool completely.
6. Once cake has cooled, prepare icing. In a small bowl, whisk together confectioners' sugar and 2 tablespoons lemon juice, adding more lemon juice 1 teaspoon at a time to make a thick but pourable icing. Spoon icing in circular motion over top of cake, allowing to drip naturally down sides. Let set for 30 minutes, then sprinkle with lemon zest strips, if desired...
