## THE BISHOP TODD CORNER

### **Bishop Townshend Responds to the London Terror Attack**

After fifteen months of loss due to a new virus (SARS-CoV-2), after a century or more of loss in Canada's Residential School system due to an old virus (racism), and after yet another outburst of appalling, murderous violence carried out on an innocent Muslim family, it is clear that the viruses of hatred and sin are still attacking us, as well.



In faith, we respond with weeping, confession, and resistance. Love is the vaccine in this kind of pandemic. In faith, we act strongly and persistently to undo and overwhelm hatred with the love of Christ. We commit ourselves to this Spirit-driven work knowing that God will overturn all the trouble of this world.

The four people who died in London were intentionally hit with a vehicle and were targeted because of their Islamic faith. This is a form of terrorism. The purpose of terrorism is to put people in a state of fear, to make them feel totally unsafe, and to somehow gain power over them. This is why our first response must be to surround the targeted people with our love, putting our bodies in the way, literally and figuratively, praying that God will give safety to the vulnerable and life to the dead.

We are praying for the peace and safety of the Muslim members of our community, and for all of those who are regularly targeted for how they look or how they love. We pray that God, our Creator, will shower mercy upon the family murdered in our city, bring healing to the hospitalized child, and shelter and comfort to all those who are fearful and hurting.

A friend helped me find this beautiful passage from the Qur'an. It speaks well to all of us about our unity, even in diversity, "People, We created you all from a single man and a single woman, and made you into races and tribes so that you should recognize one another. In God's eyes, the most honoured of you are the ones most mindful of Him: God is all knowing, all aware." -translated Syrah 49:13. This resonates so well with much of our own scriptures, our Christian beliefs, and the God who not only creates this diversity but the One who comes with power on the Day of Pentecost.

I invite each of you to find ways to constantly demonstrate that hatred will be overwhelmed by love. When facing racism, sexism, homophobia/transphobia, religious persecution, and more, we work to disable the structures and systems that support such sin. We also commit to learning how, where, and when people are radicalized to hate so that we can root out those avenues to death. We are people of God's light and life. I pray that we will re-double our efforts to learn these good ways.

Tonight, I will be participating in the Vigil at London Muslim Mosque at 7:00 pm to mourn and honour those who died. On Friday at 7:00 pm, I will walk with what I pray will be a huge number of people to demonstrate our resistance to hate. I encourage you to publicly express every act of sympathy, friendship, and solidarity you can in the wake of this horror. As the Bishop of Quebec reminded me, from their own experience of this, "No gestures are too small, because like mustard seeds they can bear important fruit." I pray for you in this good work.

### Welcome to Elizabeth Kate Judd




Thomas and Sarah welcomed Elizabeth Kate Judd into this world on May 22nd 2021.



It The drama tells the story of a boy’s orphanage in Mexico that’s hit by a hurricane. To keep their home, the boys and their caretaker Omar enter Bisbee’s Black & Blue Tournament, a fishing competition.

Teaming up with a champion fisherman, the unlikely competitors set off to sea, hoping to win the prize money and save their orphanage from bankruptcy.

Blue Miracle teases an inspiring tale in its first trailer, but is the feel-good film really based on a true story? Here’s everything you need to know about the Blue Miracle movie coming to Netflix next month.

BLUE MIRACLE IS A TRUE STORY the inspiring story behind Blue Miracle is real. The upcoming drama is based on the true story of Casa Hogar, a boy’s home in Mexico that was hit hard by Hurricane Odile in 2014. The boys really did enter Bisbee’s Black & Blue Tournament, the world’s biggest fishing tournament, and had never even fished before.

According to a press release from that year, the boys were able to enter the tournament because of the “Bisbee Cabo Charter Hook-up,” which put local charter captains who were “in real post-hurricane peril” back out on the sea. “An anonymous donor pledged to pay the entry fee through the fund to any team that agreed to hire a local boat, simultaneously injecting money into the economy and giving anglers a chance to check an item off personal bucket lists,” the report read.

## OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #4

### Lines and Tales - from Rwanda –

Any Rwanda visit takes a lot of planning. Once we get everything in order for ten visitors, the bishop's invitation letters, everyone immunized, passports secured, new American money (In Rwanda, they won't exchange old US money) flight and ride to the airport organized, the pick-up in Kigali confirmed,



and accommodations promised, we were ready. We were heading for the Dedication of the school.

We left Toronto for Heathrow, then Nairobi, Kenya and short stop in Burundi where we didn't leave the plane, then Kigali. We got better at arranging flights with only one stop, thankfully. Really, I forget all the particulars of each flight because I have been many times and have had good experience with them all. I like some carriers better than others though...like Ethiopian and KLM. In Kigali we were picked up by several vehicles as we had an hour drive ahead of us. We each had two 50-pound bags of our needs and with supplies to share. Josh who is a paramedic in Toronto canvassed suppliers he knew and provided medical supplies for many of these bags. He had plans to visit clinics to distribute these supplies. The arrival in Kigali was fairly primitive compared to today. The bags of supplies passed through customs easily where today it wouldn't be the case. I held my breath as I saw the bottles of over-the-counter pain pills visible on the security x-ray but all went well.

Driving in Kigali is fairly hectic and whomever has the biggest vehicle goes first and scooting all around the vehicles are motor bikes usually with 2 people, as they are used as taxis. We were packed tight on some roads. Most of the few traffic lights didn't work so it is usually an interesting ride. Sometimes I would just close my eyes and pray. We arrived in Shyogwe after a bumpy ride along a windy dirt road off the main highway. We were greeted warmly by Bishop Jered and others, fed and shown where we would sleep. Our visit was about two weeks long and the schedule was very full. Since the dedication was the main purpose of our visit, I will leave the visits to other Rwanda sites for the next week.

It was an hour plus over bumpy dirt roads from Gitarama to Vunga and it was a community event with Government representatives, church dignitaries and local officials. Everyone was dressed in their best and there were the very young to the very old. There was a long ceremony with speeches, dancing and singing. We presented the Canadian flag given to us by General Romeo Dallaire. It was clear, the Village of Vunga was thankful to have a vocational school so close. **I will continue next week with the visit that ten of us attended for the dedication.**

## Taste & See

## Rosemary-flavoured Mantovana Pumpkin Puree with Mackerel Fillets



### Ingredients

for 4 servings  
2 125g cans of Rio Mare Grilled Mackerel Fillets in Extra Virgin Olive Oil  
1 kg of Mantovana pumpkin  
1 small potato  
2-3 slices of onion  
2 sprigs of rosemary  
vegetable stock  
extra virgin olive oil  
salt  
pink pepper

### Instructions

1. Boil the potato with its skin in lightly salted boiled water. Wrap the pumpkin in a sheet of aluminium foil and bake in a hot oven (180°C) for 20-25 minutes until the flesh is tender when pierced with a toothpick. Take the pumpkin out of the oven, remove the skin and seeds and cut it into pieces.
2. Combine the onion slices, a sprig of rosemary and 5 tbsp of olive oil in a heavy small saucepan. Cook over a low flame, without frying, to delicately amalgamate the flavours. Filter the oil through a strainer and set aside.
3. Peel the potato, cut it into cubes and place it in the beaker of an immersion blender with the pieces of pumpkin. Blend the mixture, gradually adding a drizzle of the aromatized oil and, if necessary, a little hot vegetable stock: the end result should be a thick cream.
4. Season with salt and spoon dollops of the cream onto individual dishes. Top with the Rio Mare Mackerel Fillets in Olive Oil and then garnish with the sprigs of fresh rosemary and a few grains of pink pepper.
