

### Catch your breath



**‘The Lord is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.’**

We heard a gunshot. ‘Let’s all move away from the window, please,’ said the head of the Tearfund partner we were visiting. We all drew breath, and calmly did as instructed.

We were in Beirut, Lebanon, listening to the stories of Syrian refugees. Earlier that day a woman told me of how her family would hide under a table as conflict – missiles and rifle fire – raged outside their home.

It was a false alarm, a car backfiring. But it brought alive to me the accounts I was hearing from the Syrian families. It helped to experience that moment of fear to break me out of observer mode. And get a tiny glimpse of life in war-torn Syria.

We need that jolt sometimes to break our hearts out of our safety. To feel like we’ve been kicked in the gut. So that we can find God in situations we can’t imagine.

Lord, break our hearts for people facing unimaginable hardship. People who have lost their homes and fled with their families to seek safety. Help us to catch our breath and be prepared to speak out in prayer for those whose voices are too often not heard. Amen.



## Movie Recommended

### Wonder



Based on the New York Times bestseller, this movie tells the incredibly inspiring and heartwarming story of August Pullman, a boy with facial differences who enters the fifth grade, attending a mainstream elementary school for the first time.

August "Auggie" Pullman is a 10-year-old boy living in a brownstone in Brooklyn with his mother, Isabel; father, Nate; older sister, Via; and dog, Daisy. He was born with a rare medical facial deformity, which he refers to as "mandibulofacial dysostosis", and has undergone 27 surgeries in order to see, smell, speak and hear. Auggie has been home-schooled, but as he approaches fifth grade, his parents decide to enroll him in Beecher Prep, a private school. Before the school year begins, Auggie meets with Mr. Tushman, the principal, who arranges a tour for him with three other students: Jack, Julian, and Charlotte. When school starts, Auggie is ostracized, but soon forms a close friendship with Jack.

For Halloween, Auggie dresses in a Ghostface mask and cloak from last year when he doesn't have enough time to change to the Boba Fett costume he was planning to wear. He walks through school upbeat and confident due to the anonymity his costume affords him. However, as he enters his homeroom, he overhears Jack, who does not recognize him, joining Julian and his friends Amos, Miles, and Henry, in making fun of him behind his back by saying that "[he] would kill [himself] if [he] looked like Auggie." He becomes sick, forcing his mother to abandon her mother-daughter day with Via to bring him home. Though she is hurt, Via convinces Auggie to go trick-or-treating with her, as she has been rejected by her best friend, Miranda.



## OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #6

### Lines and Tales - from Rwanda –



The Rwandan Genocide occurred between April 7 and July 15, 1994. During this period of around 100 days, members of the Tutsi minority ethnic group, as well as some moderate Hutu and Twa, were slaughtered by armed militia..

I have visited the Genocide Memorial in Kigali probably 5 times and while there are some changes the same message prevails “Never Again”. I am going to use some pieces from the internet to help me explain best the Memorial and parts of the Genocide. While there are many Memorials throughout the country, the Kigali Memorial documents the Genocide, telling the situation prior to the event, during and after. Against one of the outer walls, there is a wide hall with the inner wall displaying the history in pictures, documents and written stories and most recently with some audible opportunities also. The lighting is quite dark and the atmosphere very solemn. Everyone speaks in whispers. The first time we visited, there was a room full of victim’s skulls and the bones from arms and legs displayed. Some skulls had pieces missing where a club or machete struck. The Kigali site, like most sites, include human remains in large cement crypts and the tools and weapons used in the human destruction. It is difficult to express the feelings while on this site where so many dead have been collected to rest and be honoured. You can almost hear, feel and sense their presence. Most recently, there is a children’s memorial, with life-sized photos, accompanied by intimate details about their favorite toys, their last words and the manner in which they were killed. There is also, an exhibition on the history of genocidal violence around the world.

One room is divided into sections along the walls with pictures of some victims so they wouldn’t be forgotten and would help educate the next generation. Audiovisual and GPS documentation projects record and substantiate survivor testimony, including and recording the Gacaca Court process. We view on a large


screen victims describing their experiences in their own words. It was emotionally hard to hear. Personally, I am ashamed of myself, while these deadly times in Rwanda were happening in 1994, I was busy focusing on OJ in his white bronco, unaware and ignorant of this atrocity. I hope I am forgiven.

## Lemon Chiffon Blueberry Dessert



### Ingredients

- 1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs (about 24 squares)
- 1-1/3 cups sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1-1/2 cups fresh blueberries, divided
- 1 package (3 ounces) lemon gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 11 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 carton (16 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed

### Instructions

1. Combine cracker crumbs, 1/3 cup sugar and butter, reserving 2 tablespoons for topping. Press remaining crumb mixture into a 13x9-in. dish. Sprinkle with 1 cup blueberries.
2. In a small bowl, dissolve gelatin in boiling water; cool. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese and remaining sugar. Add vanilla; mix well. Slowly add dissolved gelatin. Fold in whipped topping. Spread over blueberries. Refrigerate, covered, until set, about 3 hours. Top with reserved crumb mixture and remaining blueberries. Refrigerate leftovers.
