If you read last week's column, you'll recall that I introduced you to a cat we once had for Andrea when she was a little girl. His name was Smudge, an apt name because he was a long haired, black guy who we had for over 14 years.

About 4 years into Smudge's life with us when Andi was about 6 or 7, I was taking courses at university in the States. We could cut down on the time needed to graduate by taking night courses and courses on Saturday's. One Saturday night in late October I was driving home after a long day at school when I happened upon the dead body of a black, long-haired cat alongside the road. It was a short distance from our home, so I feared the worst. "Oh no" I thought, "it's Smudge. Andi will be broken-hearted." To add to this sombre, sad event, it was raining, foggy, quite dark and just a really somewhat unpleasant night now compounded by this tragedy.

I picked up the poor guy's lifeless body and put him in the back of my car and continued on home. When I got there, I turned off my lights as I drove in (this was long before running head-lights) and silently parked, retrieved the lifeless form of our pet and went to the garage. Once there, I got a spade and set off for the backyard where I cut out the sod and dug a hole for a grave. It was all so sad. How would I explain to Andi why Smudge hadn't come home that night? He'd never be around again to let a mouse go in our kitchen as he meowed with pride.

I placed his body in the grave, covered him up and replaced the sod. It was indeed a sad, sad time. Just then as I turned to take the spade back to the garage, I realized that there had been one mourner at the pet burial. I heard a familiar, "Meow... Meow," and turned to see a slightly soggy Smudge. He had been placidly sitting there watching the whole sad ceremony.

Somewhere in the Booth's Harbour area, there is/was a person who lost a cat that night, but never had to pay for burial services. Also, there were two wet and soggy souls out in the rain returning to the garage before heading into the house to be greeted by an excited little girl... not so much for me but for Doop Dee Doo, Smudge, who trotted in as if nothing had ever happened. Neither he nor I ever breathed a word of what had transpired.

Lines and Tales - from Rwanda –



Last week I spoke of the genocide and of being unable to imagine if it was 1994, those I hold dear in Rwanda would be faced with the savage death by machete. I have two young men and their families whom I love as family. It is beyond my imagination to think of them being hunted down and hacked to pieces but this is

what happened to the generation before them?

Let me introduce to you Pascal. I first met him because he connected with one of our committee members regarding Rwanda, on the internet. I was able to meet him for lunch when we visited the Rwanda museum in Huye (Butare). He could speak some English and just finished University but without a job as yet. I could tell he was sharp, ambitious and intelligent. He eventually became the Director of the school and it prospered very well under his direction. He impressed the Rwanda Government so much they offered him a job he couldn't refuse. I have kept close to him ever since. He has married a lovely lady named Noella, and they now have a son called Shelton. Just before last Christmas his sister died leaving 4 girls from 7 to 14. They have taken to love and to raise, the 7-year-old named Sonia. Last week Pascal and Noella welcomed another baby boy named Charvick. She had to go to Kigali for the birth and they just got out of Kigali on Tuesday as the Capital was closed down on the Wednesday because Covid was infecting 1000 people per day. Since Pascal works directly with the public, he has had his 2 needles.

Then there is Marcel, who is the Diocesan Director of Education and Youth Chairperson for the Diocese of Shyogwe. He is married to Emerthe and they have two boys, Nolan and Noble. He has a very faithful attitude and prays regularly, as a way of life. When he has an issue, he prays for strength and for the solution to the challenge. Around Christmas time they were fighting illness and Nolan was very ill and one night they didn't think he would make it. It is hard on little salary to afford to go to clinic for an assessment and get the medication needed. With a little help, Nolan was treated and is very well now. Marcel was promised further education in USA through a church contact from USA, visiting in Rwanda, provided he passed an English program. He studied hard and passed with flying colours but the opportunity vanished. On the positive, he speaks fluent English and is always eager to learn new words.

Taste & See

Buttermilk-Poppy Seed Skillet Cake with Strawberry



Ingredients

½ cup unsalted butter
 2 ½ cups all-purpose flour
 1 cup white sugar
 1 ½ tablespoons poppy seeds
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 ½ teaspoon baking soda
 ½ teaspoon salt
 ½ teaspoon ground cardamom
 1 ½ cups buttermilk, at room temperature
 2 large eggs
 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
 1 teaspoon almond extract

2 cups strawberries, hulled and halved

Prep: 15 mins

Cook: 1 hr

Total: 1 hr 15 mins

Servings: 10

Yield: 1 skillet cake

Nutrition Facts

Instructions

Step 1

Place butter into a 10-inch cast iron skillet. Place skillet into an oven and turn on to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) to allow butter to melt, 2 to 4 minutes.

Step 2

While butter melts, mix together flour, sugar, poppy seeds, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and cardamom in a large bowl.

Step 3

When butter has fully melted, remove skillet from oven and gently swirl to coat bottom with butter. Pour melted butter over the dry ingredients, and set skillet aside. Stir melted butter into dry ingredients a few times to allow it to cool slightly. Add buttermilk, eggs, vanilla, and almond extracts and mix just until batter has no dry clumps of flour in it.

Step 4

Pour batter into the skillet and spread into an even layer. Sprinkle halved strawberries evenly over the top and place skillet into the oven.

Step 5

Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out with a few moist crumbs, 55 to 60 minutes. If cake begins to over-brown at any point during baking process, turn the oven temperature down to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C) and continue to bake until done (baking time will vary with a lower oven temperature). Allow cake to cool before slicing.
