

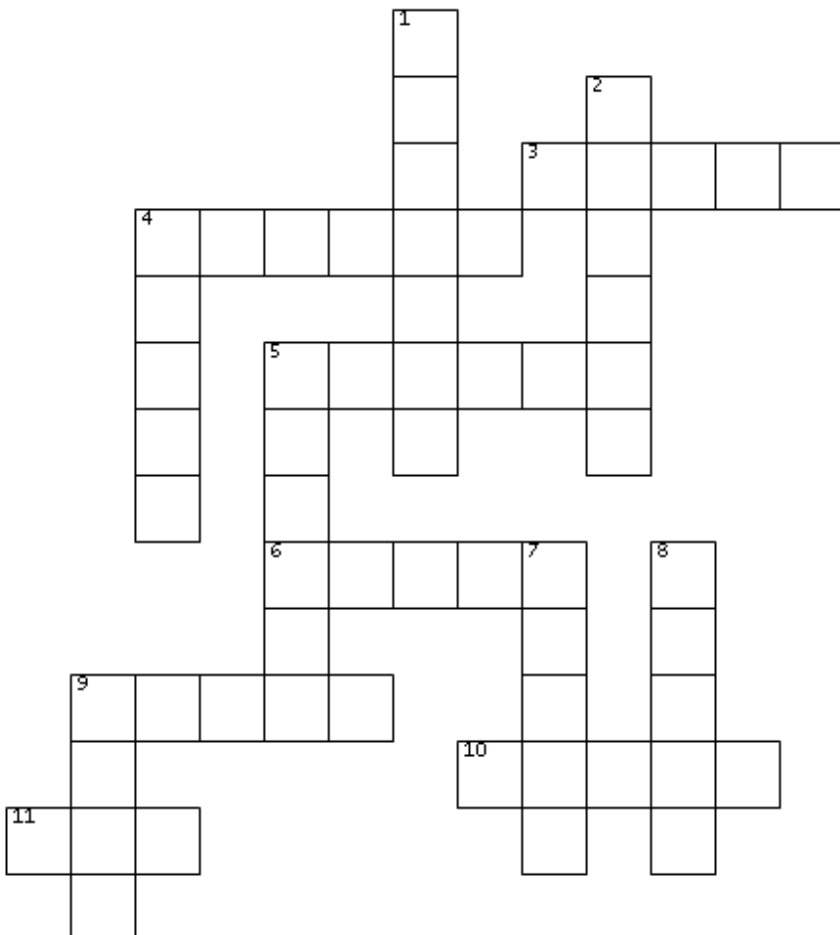

## Taste & See

### Key Lime Cream Pie



1 package (11.3 ounces) pecan shortbread cookies, crushed (about 2 cups)

#### Ingredients

1/3 cup butter, melted  
 4 cups heavy whipping cream  
 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar  
 1 teaspoon coconut extract  
 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened  
 1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milk  
 1/2 cup Key lime juice  
 1/4 cup sweetened shredded coconut, toasted  
 Optional: Maraschino cherries with stems and sliced Key limes

### Instructions

1. In a small bowl, mix crushed cookies and butter. Press onto bottom and up sides of a greased 9-in. deep-dish pie plate. In a large bowl, beat cream until it begins to thicken. Add confectioners' sugar and extract; beat until stiff peaks form. In another large bowl, beat cream cheese, condensed milk and lime juice until blended. Fold in 2 cups whipped cream. Spoon into prepared crust.
2. Top with remaining whipped cream; sprinkle with toasted coconut. Refrigerate until serving, at least 4 hours. If desired, garnish with cherries and limes.

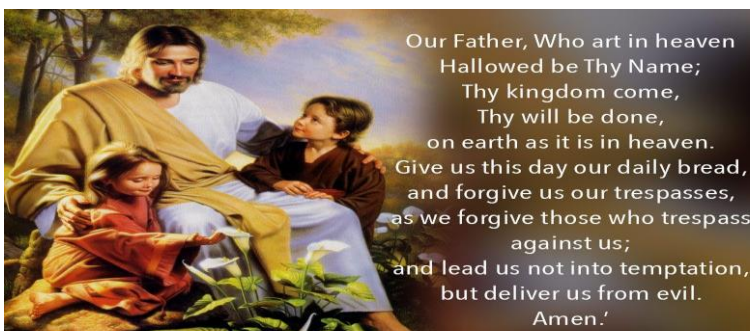

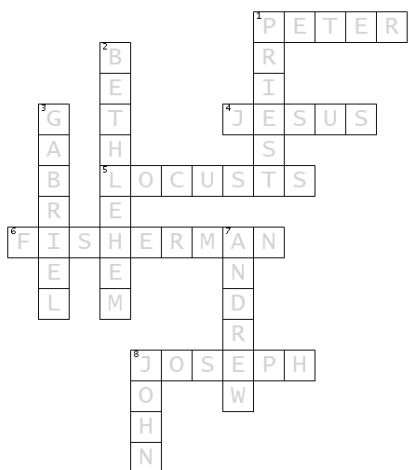
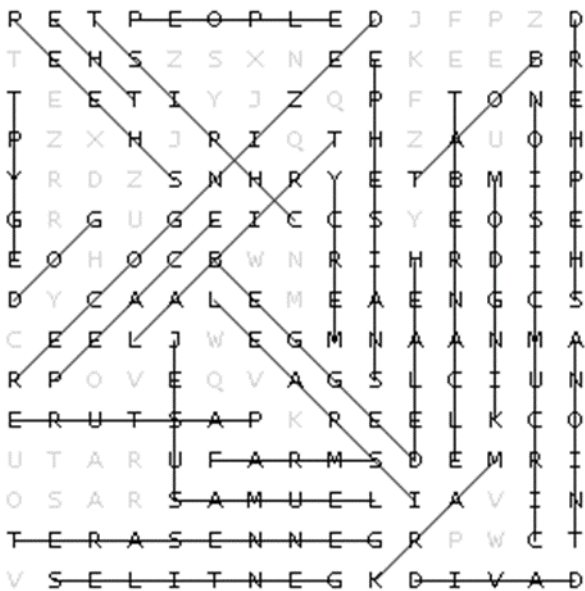
For the week beginning Sunday July 25, 2021, we will be praying for our Long Point Bay Parish, specially for our family of the church of St. John's Woodhouse.

## OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #10

### Lines and Tales - from Rwanda-



On our 2007 trip, we also visited Akagera National Park. This is one of my favourite adventures as we go on a tour of the park to see all the animals. I really look forward to seeing the different animals in their natural habitat. (I love a safari and everyday have "Wild Earth" on You Tube on my TV as I daily take a virtual safari in South Africa.

Check it out if you can) For me, it is always running in the background and when they come across lions, I always pay attention.

The night before our park visit, we all stayed at a northern Anglican Diocese Visitors Lodge which was located about an hour from the park. There are two main entrances to the park, a north and a south entrance. You have to go in the south entrance, which takes about 35 minutes from the park boundary to get to the Park Centre where you would register, pay the entrance fees and pick up a guide. We have learned a lot since that first trip and I have arranged many times for the same fellow with his vehicles to accommodate our transportation needs. He lived in Switzerland for many years and on his return to Rwanda, purchased two "Doctors without Borders" vehicles and converted them to transport people within the park. The top of the vehicle pushes up and you can view the trip this way, standing for a change instead of sitting. Aimable speaks English very well so not only is he our driver and protector but also our translator. We saw many animals but didn't see an elephant until a few years ago. Depending on when the rainy season happened will determine where you will go in the park to see the animals. When it is drier you head for the North and this can take some time but it is worth it. Water buffalo, hippopotamus, crocodile, giraffe, monkeys, zebra, warthogs, and gazella to name a few. More people in Africa are killed by hippos than any other animal. There were no rhinos or lions until 2018. They lost many animals during the genocide as people needed food to survive. They are now re-introducing and increasing the population of different species.
