


A few weeks later she once again thanked us, but did remark that Joey's voice seemed a few octaves high. Guess we missed the boat and got Joey's sister instead.



Last Sunday, 8/8/21 Pat Hemingway and I drove to St. John's (Woodhouse) Anglican church, south of Simcoe. It was the annual memorial outdoors service. There was a new minister (Fr. Some are surviving, others are slowly dying.

## OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #13

### Lines and Tales - from Rwanda-



Last week I started to tell you about Bonnie Olmstead and her contributions. Prior to any trips she also canvassed friends and co-workers to donate needed welding, carpentry and library items. Everyone in our group could bring two 50 lb bags to Rwanda, plus their carryon and computer bag. We were collecting many items and filling bags with these treasures.

Of course, the person who provided the bag since they didn't need it, got to review and basically repack so when they were asked "Did you pack this bag" everyone could say "Yes".

The Vunga school is really not that far from Gitarama where we stayed but takes an hour to get there over ratty, bumpy dirt roads but Bonnie had another ¼ of an hour more to get to another school that had electricity, where the welding equipment was located. She traveled over more primitive trails and she did it repeatedly.

Being a farm girl, Bonnie had issues with the way the chicken were being cared for as the 50 chickens were only laying 15 eggs a day and pecking and pulling the feathers from each other. Bonnie advised they set up adequate nesting areas with the creation of 12 nesting boxes padding with grass and also to allow the chickens free range. After 3 days the egg count increased to 35 with no more pecking and pulling of feathers. Plans were made to build more nesting boxes so there should be more production from the 50 hens. With funds given from friends at home she also bought more feeders and 2 water troughs for the hens.

The safety issues we found upsetting, as students totally lacked any knowledge on working safely. This she had to tackle hands-on in her welding class but she also included this in one trip by teaching classes to all, on working safely. She was given the nick-name "Safety First".

Bonnie, also with money from her daughter purchased goats for the school, three nannies and one Billy: Missy, Belle, Hokey and Pokey. She also brought for the library, small jigsaw puzzles and four 3-dimensional butterflies and everyone who entered gave it a try to put a piece in place. A "Yah!" could be frequently heard.

These are just some of the great works she did and my work there had been greatly enhanced because of her. We would still like to go one more time.
