



Where there is Don Smith who I spoke of last week, there is always Therese Smith. They are a great couple and have contributed much to the Vunga school. She worked at an Ottawa library for years, but now retired. She has taken her knowledge and organizational skills to the school dedicated to creating a library. Some of you might remember Emmanuel who visited Canada.

He has a younger brother named Innocent and he is eager, inquisitive and anxious to learn everything he can about organizing a library. He certainly looks on this as a God-given opportunity. Don and Therese always come with full 50-pound bags of books. The carpentry department made some book shelves and

several tables and chairs arrived from somewhere. They had access to a computer which they used to record and prepare each book in the dewy decimal system with its special place on the shelf.

Communications was a challenge at this time also, as Innocent really could speak best in Kinyarwanda and maybe a little French. He speaks English now fairly well and texts to Therese often. I text with him occasionally too. During the years Therese (at her own expense) has been visiting and teaching Innocent the secrets of an organized library. Innocent and the library have been her whole focus. Although, Don and Therese each trip do visit with relatives of the Rwanda friends, they have made through the refugee program in Ottawa. They are very close to some of them.

We have asked directly when visiting other vocational school to see their library and we have never seen one as good or as organized as the one at Vunga TVET. In one school, there was only half a closet for their library.

Innocent took time to get further education and the library was not cared for properly in his absence. When we visited in 2019, we realized how much Innocent did to maintain the library as there was a great need for a revamp in this department. Books were not in their right place and some books were missing. We were able to get Innocent back on staff so he is now master of the library once again. He is the one with the key. The success of this department is all thanks to the determination and love from Therese and the dedication of her student Innocent.

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

1146 - European leaders outlaw crossbow, intending to end war for all time

1535 - French navigator Jacques Cartier reaches Hochelaga (Montreal)

1837 - Pharmacists John Lea & William Perrins manufacture Worcestershire Sauce

1864 - The Charlottetown Conference, the first of a series of meetings that ultimately led to the formation of the Dominion of Canada, convened at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

1893 - American businessman and inventor Whitcomb L. Judson was granted a U.S. patent for a “clasp locker,” which evolved into the modern zipper.

1980 - Due to poor health, Canadian activist Terry Fox, who had part of his leg amputated because of cancer, was forced to end his Marathon of Hope, a run across Canada to raise money for cancer research; it was later discovered that the cancer had spread to his lungs, and he died in 1981.

1996 - The 15-year marriage of Charles, prince of Wales, and Diana, princess of Wales, ended as a final divorce decree was issued.
