

MINI STRAWBERRY CREAM CUPCAKE SANDWICHES



INGREDIENTS

- 1 pkg (432 g) Duncan Hines® French Vanilla Cake Mix
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) water
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- PAM® Cooking Spray

- 4 oz (125 g) brick style plain cream cheese, room temperature
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) strawberry jelly
- 1/4 cup (30 mL) icing sugar
- 1 cup (250 mL) 35% whipping cream
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped strawberries

STEP THREE

Bake for 3 to 5 minutes or until lightly golden and cake tester comes out clean when inserted into center of cakes; cool completely.

STEP FOUR

In large bowl, beat cream cheese, jam and icing sugar with electric mixers until light and creamy. Add whipping cream and beat until stiff peaks form. Fold in chopped strawberries and refrigerate until ready to use.

STEP FIVE

Sandwich 2 tbsp strawberry cream between 2 mini cakes. Store in refrigerator until ready to serve for up to 6 hours.

STEP ONE

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C). Whisk cake mix with water, vegetable oil, eggs and baking powder until well combined.

STEP TWO

Spoon 1 tsp (5 mL) rounds of batter onto 2 paper-lined baking sheets coated with cooking spray to make 24 rounds.

OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #16

Lines and Tales - from Rwanda-



I will pick up later to describe others who I travelled with and who provided a service to the school but presently I want to tell you about the first graduation. The education system has changed and evolved during the past 14 years. The first group of students who attended were at the school for 3 years and had a very close family-like student body.

All Rwanda schools include learning the national dance routines and singing Rwanda-familiar songs. The First Graduation Ceremony was a big deal. It was held at the school on the flats by the river and included government officials, district representatives, the bishop and church officials. The importance of the students was very much a part of the ceremony.

This ceremony was a very important event for the whole community as it drew thousands of people to view the outside festivities.

Several shaded areas and many chairs for guests to sit were set up. The bulk of the community surrounded the sandy circle, where the speeches occurred, the dancing was performed and certificates were presented. They sat or stood in the sun with or without umbrellas. Some of our visitors were honoured to present the students their certificates. They also brought other dancing groups to participate in the event. There were many speeches and the whole program was 3 to 4 hours long, similar time as a Sunday church service. Mind you it was all in Kinyarwanda language at that time. Box lunches were provided to invited guests and students. It was quite an event for such a remote and impoverished area. It provided hope and optimism for the future.
