HIGH FLIGHT

The Battle of Britain Sunday is observed on the 15th September or the first Sunday following.



There were 1,495 pilots and crew killed during the Battle of Britain, of which 49 were Canadian. Of 103 Canadian fighter

pilots in battle, 23 were killed in action. Many Canadians served in the squadrons of Spitfires and Hurricanes which repulsed the Luftwaffe in the summer of 1940. To limit confusion, the RCAF squadrons were operated as separate units from the RAF, generally keeping the Canadians together. Other Canadians flew with the Royal Air Force during that difficult period. As Winston Churchill famously said: "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few." We give thanks for airmen like John Pringle QC, Ken Keegan and all those who served in the cause of freedom. Lest we forget, Lest we forget.



HOW CAN I KEEP FROM SINGING?

On the front page of the Huron Church News this month there was an article 'Reopening our churches: the next steps' At the time the article was put together it looked like restrictions regarding congregational singing and choirs were going to be loosened up slightly. . . Alleluia! (I heard my inner voice proclaim). However, with so many things during this pandemic, due to the recent rise in Covid-19 cases in Ontario this has since changed. I want all people to know that the bishop is not being draconian, the diocese is simply erring on the side of caution with regards to our health and safety. Therefore, for the month of September, the current restrictions of congregational singing and choirs will remain in effect. I know it is frustrating and spiritually painful, but it is one of the many sacrifices we have had to make during these testing times. With new regulations concerning 'vaccine passports' being introduced by the Provincial Government coming into effect on 22nd September the diocese is also implementing extra measures in the interests of health and safety: "As Christians, we welcome all in the name of Christ and so the diocese will not be requiring vaccinations for all persons attending worship. However, those in ministry leadership positions have been entrusted with responsibilities which include protection of the vulnerable. For this reason, the following people will now be required to be vaccinated against COVID-19 to serve in the Diocese of Huron during this pandemic. All clergy who are presently in an appointment, interims, those who function as honorary assistants and who do supply. All Licensed Lay Readers. All liturgical leaders including, but not limited to, organists and choir directors, choristers, musicians, lectors, intercessors, Eucharistic Administrators, wardens, greeters and servers over 12 years of age. All Sunday School teachers and youth leaders. All pastoral visitors. To continue in these roles, all persons must have received their first dose of vaccine by September 30th and the second no later than October 31st." (Diocese of Huron) Just to make that clear friends: **No one has to show proof of vaccination status to worship at Trinity church. However, those in leadership roles, those involved in the liturgy and other areas of ministry do need to be vaccinated.** Therefore, starting next week, I am asking those involved in the various ministries mentioned above to either come to the parish office during office hours to show proof of vaccination to Kathryn, Sarah or myself or to show one of us on Sunday. The parish will maintain a record of the lay persons in these roles with an indication that they have provided proof of vaccination. The record will be kept securely. I am hopeful that this new requirement will not be viewed in a negative light but from the Christian perspective of loving our neighbours as ourselves. From conversations that I have had with many parishioners, who have returned to worship at church, all have been vaccinated and happy so to be. As we gather this information; I crave your indulgence. Yours in Christ.



CONFETTI CAKE MILKSHAKE



INGREDIENTS

- 1 pkg (15.25 oz/432 g) Duncan Hines® Confetti Cake Mix
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) 35% whipping cream
- 2 cups (500 mL) 2% milk
- 2 cups (500 mL) vanilla ice cream
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) icing sugar
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) confetti sprinkles



TIPS

- Substitute chocolate for vanilla ice cream if desired.
- Top milkshakes with a cherry if desired.
- Crumble remaining leftover cake into crumbs; mix with Duncan Hines Creamy Buttercream Frosting and make cake pops.

STEP SIX

Divide among 4 glasses; top with a dollop of whipped cream, reserved cake crumbs and confetti sprinkles.

OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #17

Lines and Tales - from Rwanda-



The school has brought so much to the community. There is a community committee that meet to discuss the progress of the school, the challenges and the plans for the future and how the community and school can work together for a common goal. When I first saw the school location it was an empty field near a river on the boundary of a remote village called Vunga.

Vunga area is a very impoverished village with mud brick houses. There was no electricity, no municipal water and no health aid close by.

During the development of the school from a five-room schoolhouse, carpentry building, welding shop, cafeteria, teacher's residence, a residence for 112 students, masonry shop, latrines, storage buildings and buildings to keep some animals were gradually acquired. With pressure from the school administration, the water line was extended to the Vunga area so the village and the school received water, although there was a cost for every jerry-can. A well was dug on school property and a submersible pump was installed. Water lines were dug to the different major buildings so water was available. There was also a line extended to off-site so the community could access water from the well. Before the municipal water and the well water was available, the community would travel to the river to get their water which wasn't safe to drink. I believe the stomach problems have been lessened with this new way to get decent water from the municipality or the school well.

In Rwanda, the sun rises at 6 am and sets at 6 pm so they have equal light and dark so without electricity everything basically stops once dark. Solar panels were sent from Germany that provided a certain amount of light and is now maintained by Emmanuel who visited Canada. With more involvement and push to get the hydro line extended it finally arrived to the village and the school. The welding class was then moved to the school as electricity was needed to operate the welders.

It is my understanding that because the school existed at Vunga that a basic clinic was created and I did take a short tour of it a few years ago. One year, I noted there were mother's and babies sitting outside the clinic waiting to be seen.

There was to be a market place at a rural village in the region and the Director at the time recommended to the government that it be put at Vunga, given the school was active in that location. Vunga village got the building.
