St. Mary is still giving birth

Why has the young Mary, Mother of Jesus, become so important to people throughout the world? It is not uncommon to find folks kneeling before a statue or picture of Mary

and praying through her as an intercessor with God.

Mary's unique place in the hearts of so many is a frequent source of confusion for those looking upon it. One woman wrote of how, when visiting Europe, it seemed that "every church is filled with recognition to Mary." So present was this phenomenon that she felt "annoyed" that Jesus was "misplaced."

Much theology (and Mariology) argues Mary's place in the church's hierarchy of importance. The more straightforward truth is that many find it uplifting to incarnate or bring into some manner of recognizing the presence of Mary in their lives. A good example is the following hymn (section) to Mary. Written by Dublin-born, English Roman Catholic priest and hymn-writer John Wyse (1825-98):

When troubles dark afflict me
 In sorrow and in care,
 Thy light doth ever guide me
 O beauteous Morning Star.
 Lo, I'll be ever ready
 Thy goodly help to claim,
 When wicked men blaspheme thee,
 To love and bless thy name.

Hispanic & Migrant Farmworker Outreach

Ministry

The Hispanic & Migrant Farmworker Outreach Ministry in the diocese of Huron is a ministry committed to making our migrant workers visible and supported in our community. Migrant farmworkers are a long way from home and sacrifice family life, support network, and their culture, coming to Canada to work and support their families back home. As Christians we want to welcome, support, include, and make them visible in our Canadian community.

Day care

The aim of St. John’s Day Care is to introduce the Anglican faith to families in Long Point Bay Parish by providing Child Care to their children while teaching them about biblical histories using children’s books and other materials that can attract children’s interests, puzzles, toys, etc. Also, provide Spanish classes, healthy homemade meals and outdoor activities. Build a bridge between the community and the Anglican Church to encourage families with younger children to acquire knowledge of our Anglican Church.

Greenhouse

This project aims to benefit those less fortunate to have access to fresh vegetables. Families living in a low income, immigrants just arriving to Canada, people who have been negatively impacted due to COVID-19 (job loss)

Population growth and less availability of food material have become global concerns. The world population increases exponentially whereas food production has increased only arithmetically, meaning that the availability of food per capita has decreased. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom by respond to human need by loving service. God wants our lives to overflow with mercy, love, and compassion the marks of His kingdom. As followers of Jesus, we have a choice: respond to unsettling realities in fear and withdraw, or follow Him in responding to the greatest needs of our day with love and hope.

It is anticipated that funding for these projects will be provided through government grants, support from the diocese of Huron and individual donations. **Donations may be made to the Parish of Long Point Bay.**

I really hope that you will support these outreach projects that put our faith into action.

“What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, “Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill,” and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? What made it particularly humorous was that Nipper, the Romeo previously mentioned, was owned by my good friend, Johnny Johnson.

The weeks passed, and on Father’s Day morning of that year, Pat called me down to Mandy’s kennel. There I found my Father’s Day present; a happy tail wagging mama and 13, count them, 13 newly born puppies. I guess Mandy and Nipper were doing more than cavorting!

At any rate, here we were with 13 puppies and totally unprepared for such an event. We had 13 squirming little rascals, and Mandy only had 8 feeding stations. I called my friend, Wray Barber who raised pigs at that time, and he let me borrow a piglet feeder which was an open topped cylinder based on a round pan with a series of nipples around the bottom from which extra piglets could feed when their number exceeded their mother’s nipples. Well other than a colossal mess at feeding time with everybody including us covered in a puppy nourishment formula that the vet provided for us, it all went really well, and we had all 13 make it to eight weeks of age.



Crustless Pumpkin Pie

INGREDIENTS

- Cooking spray
- 1 (15-oz.) can pumpkin puree
- 1 c. heavy cream
- 3/4 c. packed brown sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
- 1/2 tsp. cloves
- 1/2 tsp. ground ginger
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg



STEP ONE

Preheat oven to 325°. Grease a 9" pie plate with cooking spray. In a large bowl, whisk ingredients together. Pour into pie plate and smooth top with an offset.

STEP TWO

Bake pie until center only slightly jiggles, 1 hour. Turn off oven and prop door open with a wooden spoon and let cool in oven, 1 hour.

STEP THREE

Refrigerate until set, at least 4 hours and up to overnight.

Lines and Tales - from Rwanda



I must tell you about the roads and bridges. I have been to Rwanda at all different times of the year but never in the really rainy season. Although Bonnie and I found ourselves at Alleluia House, one of the original guest houses, we stayed in during a very intense rainfall. It was very loud on the metal roof and we started to get concerned as a river of water started to travel into

the living area from under the large double front door. We went looking for someone to let them know but could find no one. We went searching for brooms and rags to try and stop the flow. You know when you teeter between panic and giggles. Panic because we had never experienced this before and felt responsible for the place and giggles because we were venturing in every nook and cranny looking for something to help with this flooding situation plus our quick working together was inspiring and fun. We both had never had to do this before. We mopped and used the rags under the door to stop the flow.

This same force of water plays havoc on the road conditions. Wide, deep and irregular gouges are etched into the roads making a 17-mile drive take three times as long. Sometimes we needed to get out of the vehicle and walk up a hill because of the depth and the number of ruts and it also could have been because of the condition of the vehicle. Once you get off the one main road you can find any type of bridge. Many times, there are tree trunks placed side by side with the bottom on one side and the top of the trunk on the other. Sometimes a tree trunk or two can be missing which makes you hope your driver can manoeuvre this tedious challenge. I have seen a poor cow who didn't manage to make it over the bridge and had her leg between two trunks. Fortunately, the caretakers who were moving the cow were successful with the help of some passers-by to raise the animal from her predicament. It easier to show bridges in a picture than deep ruts in the road but I hope you can get the picture.
