Apple Gingerbread Skillet Cake

1. Preheat oven to 350°. Place 1/4 cup butter in a 12-in. cast-iron or other ovenproof skillet. Place in oven until butter is melted, 4-5 minutes; carefully swirl to coat evenly. Sprinkle with pecans and brown sugar; drizzle with molasses. Arrange apple slices in a single layer over sugar, cut side down.
2. For gingerbread cake: in a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Beat in egg, then molasses. In another bowl, whisk flour, baking soda, ginger, salt and cloves; gradually add to creamed mixture. Stir in hot water.
3. Pour over apples. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 35-40 minutes. Cool 10 minutes before inverting onto a serving plate. If desired, serve warm with applesauce.



INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup butter, cubed
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 2 medium tart apples, peeled and thinly sliced
- gingerbread:
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 large egg, room temperature
- 1 cup molasses
- 2-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 cup hot water
- Warmed applesauce, optional

OUR OUTREACH ON RWANDA #21

Lines and Tales - from Rwanda



One of the places we have visited was the National Museum in Butare whose city name was changed to Huye. We have visited several times especially when it was the first time visit for Canadians to Rwanda. It is an interesting museum to visit and we arrange for a viewing of the National Dancers who perform on a sheltered area behind the museum.

The dancers are in national costume and there are male and female dancers and many drums and drummers. We sit on a bench with our back to the museum and a gentleman explains about the dancers and the action begins. The female dancers are beautiful, and graceful while the males are slender, muscular and energetic. It is a memorable performance.

The vibrant costume of the dancers consists of long skirts, ankle-bands with primitive bells and head-bands made of different beads, headdresses with grass wigs, and small hand-painted shields and sticks.

The female dancers wear traditional ceremonial clothing, with a sash draped over one shoulder, worn over a long skirt and well fitted vest-like top. Music and dance have always been an essential part of their society. Rwandans danced when they had a good harvest, when a child was born, when they had victory in a war, when they were defeated, and there were different kinds of dances to express all of this.

Historically, warriors would also dance for the King when they went to present their ideas to him, and when they went back home from the war, their wives and children would dance for them and thank God for helping them survive the war. There are different dances that reflect the area they live in or the occupation they have. They have a day of feasting and giving thanks to God and their ancestors for the harvest, good things in life and as an occasion to bring Rwandans from all social ranks to cement the social fabric of Rwandan society.

The drummers are very entertaining also and have a chance to demonstrate their talent. At the end of the total performance, they pull us up to dance with them and we have an opportunity to have a picture with them also.
