

Reflection for October 18th

Good morning, members of the Longpoint Bay community. We're dealing this morning with Matthew 22:15-22. For the most part, Jesus' response here is not often understood. Remember that Jesus' response was to the question by the Pharisees, "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor or not?" Now obviously they're referring to Jewish law since, under Roman, law there would be no question. As the opening sentence of this unit makes clear it's a question meant to entrap Jesus. If he says "No" the Romans would throw him in jail, if he says "Yes" the Jewish leaders would accuse him of collaboration with the Romans. As soon as Jesus says, "Render to Caesar what belongs to Caesar" we all stop thinking. Jesus has just approved of taxes.

Before going further, let me pause and set a context that I think most of us miss – and it makes all the difference in the world in understanding the incredible response Jesus makes.

Remember a few weeks ago, God was identified with a simple phrase: "I am the God who brought you up out of the land of Egypt." God is a liberator from oppression. God was not in bed with the Pharos, God was not complicit in the oppression of the Pharos but lifted his people out of such oppression. So why would Jesus approve of, be complicit in, the obvious economic oppression of Rome? (and make no mistake about it, Roman taxation was hugely oppressive).

But let's look at the entirety of Jesus' response; "Render to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." Think about that second part. What belongs to God? Or, maybe to make it simpler, What does not belong to God? The simple answer to "What belongs to God?" is "Everything!" or "What does not belong to God?" "Nothing!" There is nothing that does not belong to God. Think about that, if you believe what I have suggested, what, then, belongs to Caesar? Exactly! But most never get that.

Let me press this a little further. If everything belongs to God, what about all my 'stuff'? (and believe me when I tell you I have had a **LOT** of 'stuff'). At this point in my life, I can honestly say, I'm beginning to understand that it's all 'gift'! I could say I worked hard for all those 'gifts'. But I really know, when I'm honest with myself, that a lot of people have worked a whole lot harder than I have for a whole lot less. There is no doubt in my mind that I have been richly blessed.

So, again at this point in my life, how do I give to God what belongs to God? I think, first of all by living out of a spirit of gratitude rather than entitlement. It's holding what I have with an open hand and not a tight fist. It's also recognizing that God has hauled me out of more Egypts than I care to count. So I find myself asking, "Are there some around me still struggling in their 'Egypt' and how can I help?"

So, this Harvest Thanksgiving, I'm asking myself how I can feed those around me still stuck in their Egypt and don't even know it yet?

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Indoor Services to resume in a limited fashion.

The Diocese of Huron has instituted a “reopening” program called “Loving Our Neighbour”, this can be accessed on the Diocesan website. We are currently in the AMBER stage of this programme. This means that we can host indoor services and events like weddings and funerals. We have very strict protocols for indoor services that include, screening, masks and strict seating and social distancing rules. This has resulted in drastically reducing the numbers of people that can safely meet inside the church. Unfortunately, we are not permitted to sing in the church but we can have communion in a creative way without needing to move from our seats.

Note that not every church will be holding a service every week as in the past. It will be as it was before, with Holy Communion every second week but the Morning Prayer services in between have been cancelled. This allows us to safely monitor the health of our congregations over two-week periods. Not all parishes or congregations are required to offer indoor services but it has become an option that we are exploring carefully. Your safety is our paramount concern, we know this pandemic is not over.
