Reflection for October 25th

Over the last several days I've been reading the texts set for this Sunday, wondering what I would focus on. I was struck by God's decision that Moses would not lead the Israelites into the promised land. He had led them out of Egypt (no small feat that!) he led them through the wilderness – and all the experiences that formed them into being a people committed to the one God, YHWH - and now, on the verge of entering the promised land, he is told he can't lead the people into this promised land. Someone else would to do that. How unfair is that!

And suddenly our situation (the parish, the deanery) struck me. We're getting new leaders! No, Wait! We're doing just fine. Really! If it ain't broke, don't 'fix it!' And I really felt for Moses. (and for Joshua). Joshua will probably hear pretty quickly that old refrain, "We've never done it that way before." or "That's not how we do things." Despite the fact that I'm sure nobody in the Long Point Bay community would say that, I'm equally sure someone will think it.

That's not a bad thing. We are creatures of habit. Having grown up on a farm, I know how the livestock move from one pasture to another. And even if you didn't know, all you'd have to do is look at the pasture and you'd see 'the path' - not lots of paths but generally one path. Introduce a new animal and it would pretty quickly adjust to the one path.

No, I am not suggesting we're all a bunch of cattle. But we are a community of people – a community that has a history of working and playing, and praying together. And the way we establish that pattern is finding out, over time, what works and what doesn't. I'm sure Moses, after years and years of leading the Israelites in some difficult and challenging situations, had figured out what worked (for the most part). But you don't have to look far to find times when things went off the rails - even for Moses.

One of the things that the Israelites discovered over time, was that, no matter what the circumstances were, no matter who was leading them, God was always with them. And, ultimately, God would lead them where they needed to go.

As we face these challenging times, with new leaders, my final piece 'wisdom' is to always face these new and challenging times with prayer – but don't forget that all real prayer is at least 60% quiet listening.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Indoor Services to resume in a limited fashion.

We are currently in the AMBER stage of this programme. Details can be found at the Diocesan website. This means that we can host indoor services and events like weddings and funerals. We have very strict protocols for indoor services that include, screening, masks and strict seating and social distancing rules. This has resulted in drastically reducing the numbers of people that can safely meet inside the church. Unfortunately, we are not permitted to sing in the church but we can have communion in a creative way without needing to move from our seats.

Note that not every church will be holding a service every week as in the past. It will be as it was before, with Holy Communion every second week but the Morning Prayer services in between have been cancelled. This allows us to safely monitor the health of our congregations over two-week periods. Not all parishes or congregations are required to offer indoor services but it has become an option that we are exploring carefully. Your safety is our paramount concern, we know this pandemic is not over.
