Advent means that something good is coming. At advent, we make ourselves ready for it. And then we wait. A long time ago a nation waited for a saviour. Judea was carried away into exile in Babylon and longed to be home. But home was miles away, and there were mountains, and mountain roads in between_ there was the promise of a return home. In advent we remember that promise. Ready yourselves, the prophets said, someone is coming who will make those twisty mountain paths straight, who will level the brutal climbs and the steep descents that keep you from home. Be ready. The one who is coming is righteous, and only a righteous people will make it home. The good news is, he will make you righteous.

They waited a very long time, though.

That captivity lasted for seventy years. After that, they traversed the mountains, but brought captivity with them. Other kings ruled them, other powers with other Gods. It was more of the same until one evening in Bethlehem, a baby was born in an innkeeper's home, down below, tucked among the hay and the warm bodies of the animals. The angels told them who this baby was. It was Emmanuel, god with them, God in flesh. He was a baby, he was righteous, and he would forgive all of their sins and make them ready.

This is the first advent. It was the promise of righteousness, not in the straining of a nation trying to find God, but in the way that God makes his people righteous, with a gift, in this case the gift of a child. And it was hope, the promise that something, someone will come and make things right again.

The hope and promise of that first advent became reality at Christmas, and that first advent gives us the pattern for the second.

We still look forward to the hope of a coming, a making right, and a healing. We are stilled called to be ready. But thanks be to God, we have a pattern to follow. This time we aren't going through it blindly. We know that waiting and preparation come to reality with the singing of angels and the birth of a new life. We look forward to Christ's coming again with the full assurance that Christ has already come, that the waiting will be worth it. There is still a very good gift to come, eternal life is somewhere just over the horizon. We have hope. We have life to look forward to and the gift of a life to look back on in promise. And we are still called to be ready.

That's what the prophets called for.

Be righteous. That's what the prophets demand.

Be clean, that's who will find eternal life in God's kingdom.

On their own, you might come to think that preparedness, righteousness, and cleanliness are an impediment to hope.

You can hold on to hope if. Hope is for the righteous. Hope is for the ready. Hope is for the clean clean.

But like so much in the kingdom of God, advent is something that God does. And so are readiness, cleanliness, and righteousness.

We are ready because of the Spirit alive in us. We are clean because of the cleansing of baptism, and we are righteous because God has made us righteous in his dying and rising to life again. In our Gospel reading, John the Baptist tells of the hope of a coming saviour, and proclaims repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Christ is coming, he said. And we were filled with hope. Be forgiven, he said, and by God's grace we are made ready.

At Christmas, in a few weeks. We will celebrate the great joy of a fulfilled hope.

But advent, our time of preparation, is no less filled with grace. Advent's preparation is not the desperate act of the helpless, but the gift of God to all who ask.

Advent may not be the celebration of Christmas, but it is a celebration. This time, too, witnesses to the goodness of God and the great gift of salvation. By the grace of God, when God comes again, we will have been filled by the Holy Spirit, made clean by the son, and welcomed home by God the father. We will, by God's work in us, be ready. **Thanks be to God.**



Day care

The aim of St. John's Day Care is to introduce the Anglican faith to families in Long Point Bay Parish by providing Child Care to their children while teaching them about biblical histories using children's books and other materials that can attract children's interest s, puzzles, toys, etc. Also, provide Spanish classes, healthy homemade meals and outdoor activities. Build a bridge between the community and the Anglican Church to encourage families with younger children to acquire knowledge of our Anglican Church.

<u>Greenhouse</u>

This project aims to benefit those less fortunate to have access to fresh vegetables. Families living in a low income, immigrants just arriving to Canada, people who have been negatively impacted due to COVID-19 (job loss)

Population growth and less availability of food material have become global concerns. The world population increases exponentially whereas food production has increased only arithmetically, meaning that the availability of food per capita has decreased. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom by respond to human need by loving service. God wants our lives to overflow with mercy, love, and compassion the marks of His kingdom. As followers of Jesus, we have a choice: respond to unsettling realities in fear and withdraw, or follow Him in responding to the greatest needs of our day with love and hope.

It is anticipated that funding for these projects will be provided through government grants, support from the diocese of Huron and individual donations. **Donations may be made to the Parish of Long Point Bay.**
