<u>Reflection</u> - The life and example of Wangari Maathai

Wangari Muta Maathai was a Kenyan environmental and political activist. In the 1970s, Maathai founded the Green Belt Movement, an environmental non-governmental organization focused on the planting of trees, environmental conservation, and women's rights. In 2004, she became the first African woman to receive the Nobel Peace Prize for "her contribution to sustainable development, democracy and peace". Maathai was an elected member of Parliament and served as assistant minister for Environment and Natural Resources in the government of President Mwai Kibaki between January 2003 and November 2005. She passed away in 2011. "It is the little things citizens do that will make a difference. My little thing is planting a tree" Wangari Maathai The Green Belt movement has planted over 51 million trees in Kenya. This Season of Creation manual is dedicated to her memory. May her inspiration live on in us.

This is the prologue to the Anglican Church of Canada resource on the Season of Creation. I wanted you to read it for two reasons. First, because many of us have never heard of this remarkable woman who is a great example to us all, and second, because her philosophy, "It is the little things citizens do that will make a difference" is exactly the attitude that provides us with hope not overwhelming despair.

Last week I suggested that Christian Stewardship is about realizing that we humans are very much part of Creation, not separate. It is un unhelpful trick of the mind to think of ourselves as separate from the world we live in, yet many people go through life somewhat oblivious to the air, water, food and ecosystem that keeps us all alive. Last week Paul suggested we "Wake up" to the coming of the Reign of God. The Reign of God is about God's will for humanity and all the rest of God's creation. As good Stewards we can be Awake and begin to pay attention to the world around us. I know that when I begin to pay attention I notice my own thoughtless actions that contribute to the problems around us. Once we notice, we can begin to change our behaviours. Awareness is the first step. Awareness can lead to ideas about how we could do things differently. This is where Wangari Maathai's example comes in. Instead of just worrying about everything and then feeling despondent and paralyzed, we can pick some small thing and begin to make a small difference in one area of our behaviour. I really hesitate to give examples because the minute I give you an example you might take it as a suggestion. We have lots of people out there giving us suggestions and ideas about helping the environment. The problem isn't the lack of ideas of how to change the world, it is the lack of motivation to change the world. Motivation is, for me, a spiritual issue. Will we "Wake Up" to God's will for our lives and the world around us. Will be actively participate in that Dream God has for us. It all starts with awareness: We are really part of God's creation and God's plan for this world. May you have a safe and mindful week and be a cocreator with God of a better world for us, our children, and grandchildren!

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Indoor Services to resume in a limited fashion.

The Diocese of Huron has instituted a "reopening" program called "Loving Our Neighbour", this can be accessed on the Diocesan website. We are currently in the AMBER stage of this programme. This means that we can host indoor services and events like weddings and funerals. We have very strict protocols for indoor services that include, screening, masks and strict seating and social distancing rules. This has resulted in drastically reducing the numbers of people that can safely meet inside the church. Unfortunately, we are not permitted to sing in the church but we can have communion in a creative way without needing to move from our seats.

Your congregation will be sending out an email prior to their first indoor service with a description of what to expect. Pt Rowan is starting this week and Woodhouse will follow on September 20th. Note that not every church will be holding a service every week as in the past. It will be as it was before, with Holy Communion every second week but the Morning Prayer services in between have been cancelled. This allows us to safely monitor the health of our congregations over two week periods. Not all parishes or congregations are required to offer indoor services but it has become an option that we are exploring carefully. Your safety is our paramount concern, we know this pandemic is not over.
